

Community Service Gains Mary Simpson - 'Ford Award'

MARY SIMPSON
A young Georgetown mother of two children, who spends an average of three days and evenings a week on volunteer community service, is Ford of Canada's 'Citizen of the Year.'

Mrs. Mary Simpson, 36, of 101 Rexway Drive was presented the Town Crier Bell by Ford of Canada president Karl E. Scott at the company's Community Service Awards dinner held at the Seaway Towers, Toronto, Thursday.

Mrs. Simpson was selected from among 119 nominees who are employees, or their spouses, from the Oakville Assembly plant, the Ontario Truck plant and Ford of Canada's Central office, all in Oakville.

She is the wife of Dix Simpson, an Oakville Assembly plant employee.

COMMUNITY SERVICE
In addition to the 'Citizen of the Year' award, engraved plaques for outstanding community service were awarded to 13 persons — five of them women — and citations to 105 others. Plaque recipients are from Oakville, Burlington, Hamilton, Georgetown and Hornby.

The Community Service Awards program, sponsored by Ford of Canada's Oakville Community Relations Committee, recognizes voluntary citizen participation in community-benefit endeavours by Ford of Canada employees or their spouses. Judging was conducted

ed by J. R. Young, executive director and secretary of the Hamilton United Appeal; Rev. E. F. Dutcher, minister, Clarkson Road Presbyterian Church, Mississauga; Jack Dennett, CFRB news commentator.

ARRANGED COURSES
Mrs. Simpson's service in 1969 was with the Georgetown YM-YWCA, the Georgetown Red Cross and a self-initiated program to educate Georgetown and area residents on the growing drug problem.

In the Red Cross organization, she was second vice president, vice chairman of services for senior citizens, chairman of first aid and an area captain in the fund drive. A first aid examiner, she arranged courses in which 30 nurses were trained as first aid instructors, gave first aid training to camp counsellors, helped organize a rescue breathing clinic for school teachers and pool owners and assisted at blood donor clinics.

Mrs. Simpson, a registered nurse, received the Red Cross 'Certificate of Merit' in recognition of her work as a volunteer in 1969.

has also been a canvasser for the YM-YWCA, treasurer of Ballinlad United Church and president of the United Church Women.

Mrs. Irene Saunders, Hornby an employee who used her home for the collection of used clothing for destitute children in India and helped organize a shower of household goods for an elderly couple whose home had been destroyed by fire. 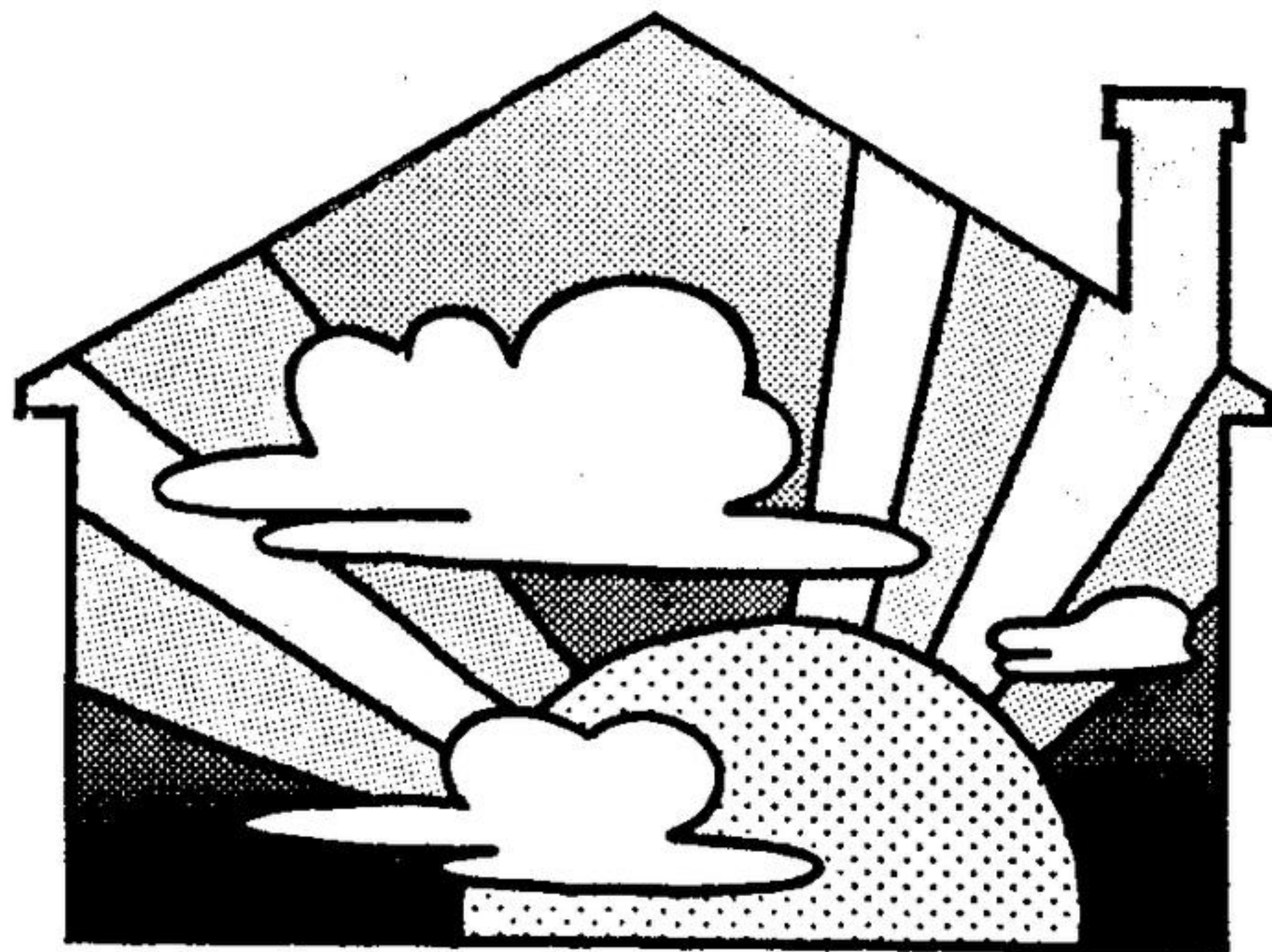
