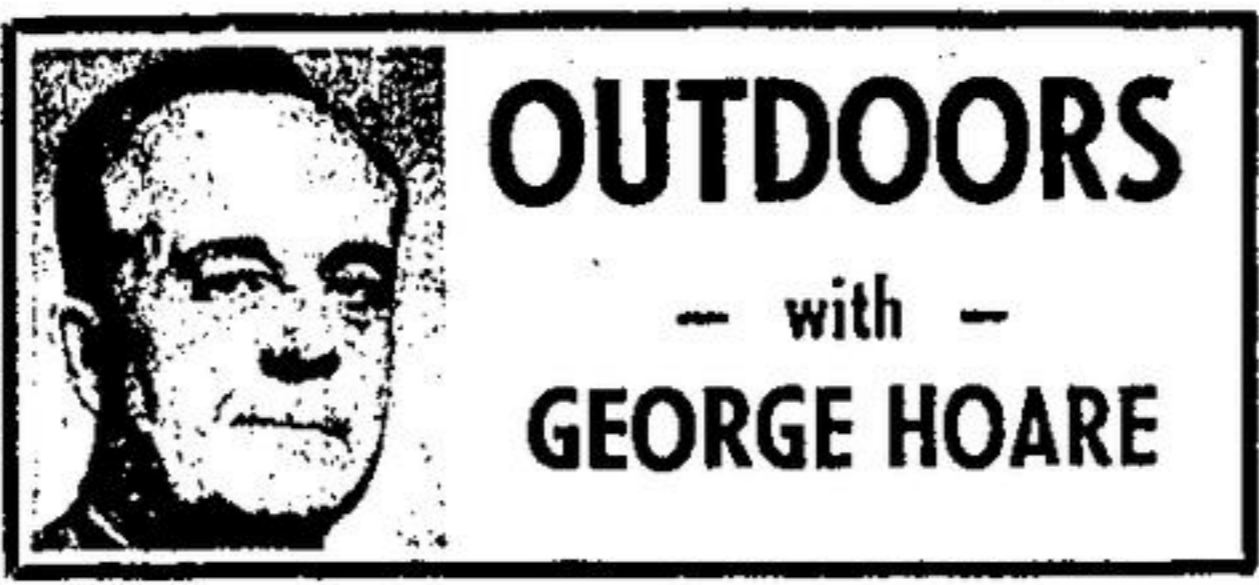




JOHNNY'S SPIEL SIGNALS SEASON'S SWITCH

Trout's Homing Instinct Phenomenon of Nature

Spring is gradually strangling old man winter. The sun is warm but the air is cold. One day last week was an exception. In mid-afternoon a nice warm breeze was blowing. The anglers call it a fishing breeze.

Much snow is still out in the rural areas, but signs of spring are all around us. The tulips are coming up along with other perennials.

The robins are pulling big fat dew-worms up from the ground and the teenagers are seen riding bikes with a fishing rod on the handle bars.

The local rivers are a little high as yet. But should be ideal for fishing when opening day rolls around, if the heavy rains hold off. The flood threat should be nil also. So let's hope

HOMING TENDENCIES

Several species, more familiar to Ontario residents, have displayed homing tendencies in some waters. Among these are rainbow trout, lake trout, yellow pike and the common white sucker.

SPRING SPAWNERS RAINBOW, PICKEREL AND SMELT

It takes a nice warm rain to give the spring spawners the urge to migrate up-stream. An experienced angler knows by the feel of the weather just when the best time is.

If you go to watch them migrating make sure you have your movie camera, and I might add don't rely on buying films along the road, buy them locally. Avoid disappointment.

I know, it happened to me last year, at Nicholson's Dam near Alliston. The weather was perfect. The big rainbows were jumping on the apron of the dam. The fish trap at the top of the fish ladder was full and the department of lands and forests officers were lifting them out, taking scale samples, and spawn and also tagging them. They were then released up stream. The whole story for a nice film was there. I had relied on some stores in Alliston for films. They were closed up.

TROUT HOMING INSTINCT IS SUBJECT OF STUDY BY L & F

A number of Canada's fish species show a marked homing instinct, most dramatically demonstrated by the various species of Pacific salmon which as adults, return unerringly to the place of their birth for spawning.

It has been shown in various experiments that, almost without exception, these fish can identify not only their home stream but the specific branch

Knowledge of a homing characteristic in a fish species can be extremely useful to department of lands and forests personnel involved in fisheries management. New sub-populations are sometimes established by constructing spawning areas and seeding them for several years with eggs in a late stage of development.

If the project is successful, a large percentage of fish hatching on the new beds should return to them to spawn after reaching maturity. Care must be taken by employees working around existing beds as an alteration in the beds may result in the fish abandoning them.

Work began on Lake Nipigon last year to determine the strength of the homing instinct in brook trout.

Adult brook trout were tagged in two bays in Lake Nipigon and an experimental planting of their eggs in the Postage River (Geraldton district) was made in an effort to gain some knowledge of their homing instinct.

LIMESTONE LAKE IS PRODUCTIVE PROJECT

Most people from the Nipigon area of northern Ontario are familiar with Limestone Lake. This small spring-fed body of water is in the centre of a unique 45 square mile territory located a few miles northeast of Nipigon, consideration must be given to fish, wildlife recreation and all aspects of multiple use must be made compatible and of benefit to everyone.

G. Marek, Management Forester for Geraldton district, asked his seven year old daughter what she liked to do at Limestone Lake.

Prepare for Kinsmen Girls Eighth Softball Season

It's time again for the young girls to dig out that flattened ball glove from the basement shelf, pound it into shape, and practice laying some wood on the ball.

Under the guiding hand of league commissioner Pete Pomeroy, the Kinsmen Girls' Softball League has been getting the preliminary works underway for the 8th season of softball. Acting as Pete's right hand, are assistant commissioner Mary Cooper and umpire-in-chief Al Murphy. The approaching full diamond season is apparent as the posters and ads begin appearing around town informing all young girls of the area that there is a ball league especially for them.

FORMS IN SCHOOL

Something new came to pass this year as the girls and boys ball leagues joined together to get the information and registration forms into the local schools from grades 4 through 8.

Eight years ago the Kinsmen Club of Georgetown surveyed the lack of summer sports for young girls, and led by Kinsman Gary Alton, the first girls league was formed. Only 8 teams, 4 in each of the junior and senior division, competed that year. Since then the league has more than doubled in size.

The junior league is a special division for girls who fit the 10 to 12 year category. They must be 10 as of May 9 and can sign on for the \$1.50 registration fee . . . There is a maximum fee of \$3. per family et. Each player will be insured, provided with a team sweater and coached by enthusiastic volunteer coaches on proper ball diamonds, umpired by volunteer umpires. They will play every Tuesday evening beginning June 9 through to September at the Georgetown Park.
