Discuss Sharing Town Minor Hockey Costs

Esquering council moved a step closer to sharing the recreation costs of three adjacent towns Monday night, after Milton Minor Hockey Association told them in a letter that 50 of the 500 children playing minor hockey were from Esquering.

At present council is considering sharing the costs of hockey only, but may include baseball, if enough Esquering residents play in the towns.

PAY EXTRA

Milton Minor Hockey Association budget for 1970 is \$1250. "Roughly 10% of the kids are from the township," said the deputy reeve.

Cr. Ken Marshall pointed out that out of town residents pay an extra \$2 to register in the Milton league.

"If we give them a grant, that would disappear," said deputy reeve Tom Hill.

Tom Hill suggested the same kind of statement, showing the number of township children playing minor hockey, should come from the three towns.
