

Objects to Ontario One-Way-Street Idea

Making Ontario Street a one-way street from No 7 highway would not solve a danger to school children in the opinion of Thomas Gadd.

Mr. Gadd, who lives on Ann Street, told council Monday that he is opposed to any such plan, as area motorists would then have a roundabout route to reach the highway. And it would create an even more dangerous problem at the far end of Ontario he said.

STUMP REMAINS
He said he understood council had plans for widening the street and this included moving a house and cutting some trees. One tree had been cut but the stump remains, he said, and if this is removed it would lessen the hazard.

Road chairman Bill Smith explained that the one-way street had been discussed at a committee meeting but no decision has been made. The original widening plan has hit a cost snag. \$11,000 was put aside in 1966 towards the job, but the town engineer says this is only a small part of what it would cost.

ESQUEUING COUNCIL BRIEFS
Esqueuing Council on Monday, agreed to lend the Georgetown High School 300' of snow fencing, and posts to enclose a newly seeded part of the playing field, provided it is returned in good condition or replaced.

• In future the township will charge 25c a page for running off copies on their machine. Up till now they have given this service for nothing.

• Esqueuing's share of the costs of operating Hornby Community Centre in 1969, amounted to \$886. The park is owned jointly by Oakville and Esqueuing.

Wants Land Use Change Old Church Property

"Better start preaching and holding services in your garage," was Reeve George Currie's advice to Gordon Barnes, when he applied for a building permit for a repair garage on the site of the old Ashgrove Church.

Clerk Delmar French claimed the land use couldn't be changed without an amendment to the by-law which could take up to a year.

The reeve said the land had been used for a church as long as he remembered.

"It's simply not right to keep a man dangling who has bought a piece of property in good faith," commented Cr. Ken Marshall.

The application was turned over to the Planning Board for their advice.
