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CUBS INSPECT CLAIREVILLE DAM SITE

Clairville dam, why it's there and how it controls flooding, is a subject Cubs of the 15th Georgetown B Pack can speak on at length this week. Sunday, they attended an open house at the dam and were given attentive treatment by one of the guides who took them through the control tower and valve rooms under the dam.

When work is finished the Clairville dam and lake will be the nucleus of a complete recreation area. It is the newest flood control project of the Metropolitan Toronto Conservation Authority. Right now 120 acres are under water but the five gate dam can flood 750 acres.

OPP in North Halton Summons 42, Warn 38

Members of the Ontario Provincial Police stationed at North Halton Detachment worked a total of 1,047 hours, and logged 10,714 miles on area roads during the week of April 12 to 18, inclusive. Driving infractions resulted in 42 motorists being summonsed for court appearance, while 38 others received warnings for minor errors. Convictions were registered against 82 persons during proceedings in Provincial Court this week.

TWO BREAK-INS

Officers responded to 28 general occurrences during the 7 day reporting period. Included were 1 theft investigation, 2 occurrences of breaking and entering, 3 investigations under the Liquor Control Act resulted in charges being laid against 4 persons. 1 missing person was reported for investigation, 2 persons were charged with dangerous driving after a complaint of erratic driving was investigated, and 3 impaired drivers were apprehended. Other occurrences were minor in nature and required little time to clear.

SIX HURT

The number of traffic accidents investigated this week dropped to 7, with 4 of these resulting in injuries to 6 persons. Total property damage was estimated to be approximately \$7,950. Some causes of the collisions were: careless driving, mechanical failure, and following too closely, and 1 deer was killed when it ran into the path of a car. As a result of investigations, 5 charges were laid against drivers involved.

Wants Georgetown Spell Out Who Shares What Facilities

Milton Recreation Committee, following Acton's lead, asked Esquing council on Monday to share in some of the costs of recreation, extended to township residents.

The Committee's letter pointed out that they were happy to have out of town residents take part and had made no distinction in the past. Among the recreation facilities available were listed winter swimming at the School for the Deaf, swimming in the community pool, swimming lessons, playground and day camp programs, all of which are subsidized by municipal taxes, said the letter. Continuing it stated 170 boys from outside Milton participated in the various events.
