

LET'S PLAY BRIDGE

Here is a hand that gave several players difficulty last week.

West dealt with both sides vulnerable.

NORTH
S-J 10 4
H-A K J 9 5
D-A 7
C-Q 9 8

WEST
S-Q 9 3
H-10 8 6 4 2 H-Q
D-K Q 6 4
C-K C-10 6

SOUTH
S-A J
H-7 3
C-10 2
C-A J 7 5 4 3 2

The bidding:

WEST N-1 NT **EAST** S-3 C
Pass 3 H Pass 4 C
Pass 5 C All Pass

Only one pair played this as a part score contract. They got all the way to two hearts which they just made. One pair went all the way to slant. Looking at all the cards you can now have two good hearts; see if 13 tricks are there but would you see it at a card table? The opponents do not go around showing you their cards.

I was sitting north and the only way you could go

is to play a high heart. When East ruffs you are one trick short of your contract.

CALL TENDERS FOR FIRE HALL

A by-law authorizing the town works superintendent to call for tenders for a new \$80,000 fire hall at Orangeville was passed at council Monday night.

Declarer played the heart king and was surprised when East contributed the queen. He led the club queen and finesse'd losing to West's stiff queen.

West led back the heart deuce. What should declarer do? What would you do if you could only have seen the North-south cut? East could easily hold the queen — ten of hearts for his original play.

However, it doesn't matter what East holds. You should play the heart nine. If East has the ten he is welcome to it for in dummy upon which you can discard your loser. If East has as is the case, you still have two good hearts for discards.

NOTES:

1. The Expropriations Act, 1900 provides that,

(a) where an inquiry is requested, it shall be conducted by an inquiry officer appointed by the minister of justice and Attorney General;

(b) the inquiry officer,

(c) shall give every party to the inquiry an opportunity to present evidence and argument and to examine and cross-examine witnesses, either personally or by his counsel or agent, and

(d) may recommend to the approving authority that a party to the inquiry be paid a fixed amount for his costs of the inquiry, not to exceed \$200 and the approving authority may in its discretion under the expropriating authority to pay such costs forthwith.

2. 'owner' and 'registered owner' are defined in the Act as follows:

'owner' includes a mortgagee, tenant, execution creditor, a person entitled to a limited estate or interest in land, a committee of the estate of a mentally incompetent person or of

a person incapable of managing his affairs, and a guardian, executor, administrator or trustee in whom land is vested;

'registered owner' means an owner of land whose interest in the land is defined and whose name is specified in an instrument in the proper registry, land titles or sheriff's office, and includes a person shown as a tenant of land on the last revised assessment roll;

3. The expropriating authority, each owner who notifies the approving authority that he desires a hearing in respect of the lands intended to be expropriated and any owner added as a party by the inquiry officer are parties to the inquiry.


