Mrs. Bourque lost track of her father, Pat Rodway, 10 years ago, when he moved from his about-to-be demolished house in London, England. In the move he lost her address and that of her sister, Mrs. Joan Landry, Magdalen Island, Quebec.

FOUND ADDRESS

After trying for three years to locate him, Mrs. Bourque concluded he was dead. Just recently Mr. Rodway found her address in an old trunk, and immediately wrote her.

Six weeks ago, upon receiving the letter and seeing the familiar handwriting, she dropped two bags of groceries, eggs and all, and burst into tears.

That same day she placed a call to him, and finally spoke to him at 4 in the

morning our time.

BOOKED PASSAGE

Within a month, she had booked his passage and finally saw him for the first time since she left England as a war bride in 1945.

Second Separate School For Georgetown by 1971

A second separate school for Georgetown has been given top priority by the Ontario Dept. of Education, said board chairman Peter Walters last week.

The board has possession of the property needed for the school and Ontario Municipal Board approval of the project is all that is needed to get the project going.

The other separate school in Georgetown, Holy Cross, is very overcrowded, said Walters.

To be ready by September, 1971, the unnamed school is to be built on an open concept.

A suggestion was brought forward at the board meeting

that the board should hire a firm of Kitchener architects who have designed a similar school on an open concept plan at a cost of \$12 a square foot.

Normally, said Mr. Walters, it costs roughly \$18 a square foot to build a school in Halton County. Board member Robert O'Brien from Burlington suggested the board should hire an architect from within the county and specify the plans which they would like to follow.

The board decided to confer at a later date with the Kitchener firm of Horton and Ball.
