- Councillor Fred Harrison told council on Monday that the cenotaph will be moved from the corner of Guelph and Main Streets to a new site in Memorial Park next week.
  - Controversy over responsibility for fixing Delrex East roads appears to have been amicably settled. On Monday, Mayor Ern Hyde reported to council that at a meeting that afternoon between Delrex and the Dept. of Highways had "basically agreed to bring roads to DHO standards."
  - A 27 year old North York teacher, Harry Knapper, has been chosen from some 15 applicants to fill the principal's position at Harrison Public School. Principal Harold Henry will vacate the principal's office at the end of the current term to teach in North York.
  - An unforeseen increase in construction costs resulting in high tenders has left the hospital campaign total short of the required amount. In a news letter, Monday, publicity director Tom Ferguson said that the construction contract will probably be signed this week, an urged those who had not made contributions to do so. It was believed that the search for funds was over when \$250,000 target amount was reached, but the opening of the tenders revealed the original estimate low by several thousand dollars.

# Public Health Nurses Sign for 7% Increase

Following four months of negotiations, the Halton County public health nurses have accepted a new contract giving them a 7 per cent wage increase.

The 24 nurses voted on the County offer last week.

The most contentious point in the negotiations was the nurses' car allowance. They were getting \$45 a month plus 5 cents a mile. Under the new agreement they will get \$50 plus 7 cents a mile, still less than what they asked for, said Warden Allan Day.

## TWO YEAR CONTRACT

The two-year contract is retroactive to the first of this year.

Bargaining came to a standstill a few weeks ago when the nurses said they would go to conciliation. However, representatives met again with the county negotiating committee and thrashed out the agreement accepted Wednesday night.
