The farmers are now forced to keep more pesticides or hand and in some cases the individual pesticides are harder to obtain.

LASTED LONGER

DDT was an' all round pest feide, that lasted longer and took care of most of the bugs and insects that plagued the fruit and vegetable farmers. It was easily obtained and relatively inexpensive but would not break down in the soil.

When DDT came under fire it was generally agreed by most men in agriculture that the pesticide needed to be banned in some areas but not in all. They felt that a more DATSUN prudent use of the pesticide would have been sufficient to reduce its harmful effects.
