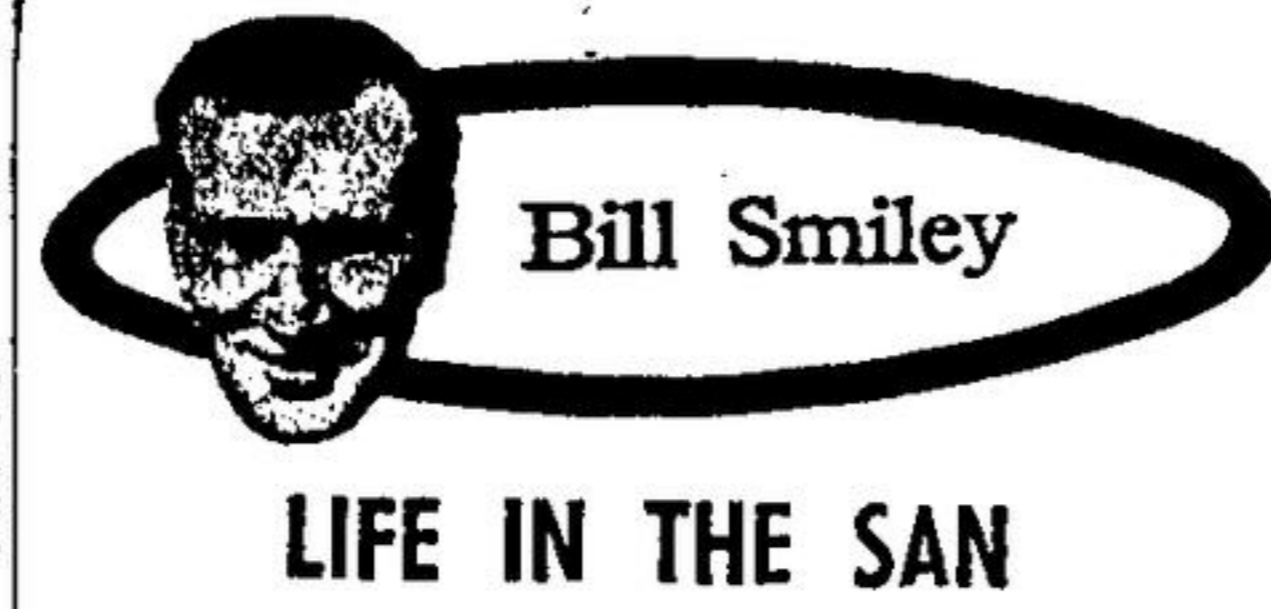

## LIFE IN THE SAN

Went for a chest x-ray today and had quite a reminiscence with the doctor who examined me. It turned out that he was the second in command at a sanatorium where I spent one of the most dreary years of my life.

He's retired now and does this work as a part-time thing. He told me I wouldn't believe what has happened to the San. When I was there, it held about 1,500 patients. It now has 300. Average length of stay then was 18 months. Today it is three months.

T.B. wasn't a comparatively simple thing when I was there. Three people died in three months in one ward I was in, because their lungs were so rotten they couldn't breathe. Two of them were in their 20's.

The tensions, frustrations and monotony of life in a sanatorium have been described often enough. It was like being in jail, except you couldn't walk around. And always, hovering in the air, like a couple of vultures, were two things: Surgery and your 'culture.'

Surgery meant hacking out most of your ribs on one side, to collapse a lung that was too far gone, or removal of the lung.

If your 'culture,' a sputum test, broke down within two or three weeks, you had another three or six months added to your sentence.

I was lucky. All I had was a shadow on my lung. I felt fine. I never had a 'positive' result from tests, and I couldn't even muster enough sputum for a culture. But it still wasn't much fun.

Perhaps I acclimatized better than most. I'd had a year in prison camp, not too long before — good training for life in the San. I had learned that time does pass, however snail-like, in such circumstances.

But I was dreadfully lonely at first, and pretty resentful towards the gods. I had been married six weeks when the shadow on the lung was discovered. About a week later, something else was discovered. My wife was pregnant. We were about 200 miles apart, with no money for train trips to visit. This was the worst period.

How times change. Nowadays my wife thinks nothing of spending \$10 on a long-distance call to one of the kids, for no particular reason. In those days, I was on full pension. I think it was \$55 a month, and the government kept back \$15 of it to help pay for my keep.

So it was letters, one a day. There's still a bushel basket of them in the attic, full of purple prose; what we'd call the baby, and stuff. I feel like an old fool when I read them now, and my wife weeps and wonders why I don't write poems and goody stuff to her nowadays.

But I shook down into life at the San, and as always in retrospect, I remember mostly the good things, and the funny things.

I began a writing course, and won a prize. I wrote scripts for the San radio station. I played chess for hours a day with the guy in the next bed and became a tolerable, though erratic, player.

Most of us were young veterans, and we had a certain esprit de corps, which meant beating the establishment. For

example, the food was nourishing, but lousy, like all institutional food. One chap had a wife who smuggled in bacon and eggs and onions. Every night, about an hour after the nurses had snuggled us down, and while the night nurse smoked and drank coffee, the action would begin.

Out would come the illicit hot plate, and the forbidden frying pan. The spryest, usually I, would whack up a great, reeking feed. And with a lamp, carefully screened, we'd play poker until 4 a.m. No wonder they had trouble rousing us at five for our morning wash.

If it was a special occasion, maybe a birthday, we'd chip in and buy a Mickey. Oh, yes. We had a bootlegger — who was also a bookmaker — among the patients. He was tubercular and also diabetic, dying on his feet, but he staggered around the wards each day, taking bets and orders.

You'd be surprised how far a Mickey goes among four T.B. cases, when they haven't had anything stronger than milk for a month. Like most of life, it wasn't all bad.

## Top Breeder Award Fifth in a Row

Rock Ella Jersey Farm Ltd. of Hornby, has just been awarded their fifth Constructive Breeder Award on the high type and production of their herd. In qualifying for this award 22 tested cows in the past year have an average production of 11,162 lbs. milk and 590 lbs. fat, 5.29 per cent m.c. (BCA 147-144).

The average classification of 43 head in the herd is 86.39 per cent. During this period, the bull, Campbell H. C. Senator, Very Good, was proven a Gold Medal Sire in their herd. Campbell H. C. Senator is a Silver and Gold Medal Senior Superior Sire with a rating on 28 daughters of 9,000 lbs. milk, 502 lbs. fat, 5.58 per cent (m.c.) and 16 classified average 84.88 per cent.

Rock Ella Jersey Farm Ltd. is the incorporated farm of Kenneth Ella and family. Mr. Ella was the president of the Ontario Jersey Club in 1969.

## Notice of Application for Approval to Expropriate Land

This Notice First Published at Georgetown on the 23rd day of April, 1970

IN THE MATTER of an application by The Corporation of the Town of Georgetown for approval to expropriate land being part of the west half of Lot 19 in the 9th Concession in the Township of Esquesing, now in the Town of Georgetown in the County of Halton, for the purpose of the construction and installation of a sanitary sewer as an integral part of the sewer system for the said Town.

NOTICE IS HEREBY given that application has been made for approval to expropriate the land described as follows as a permanent easement for the purposes aforesaid:

ALL AND SINGULAR that certain parcel or tract of land and premises situate, lying and being in the Town of Georgetown in the County of Halton and Province of Ontario and being composed of part of the West Half of Lot 19 in Concession 9 in the Township of Esquesing now in the said Town of Georgetown, containing by admeasurement 0.007 acres be the same more or less and which said parcel of land is more particularly described as follows:

PREMISING that Guelph Street in the said Town of Georgetown has a bearing of North 85 deg. 59' 30" West astronomical and relating all bearings herein thereto;

COMMENCING at a point in the North-West limit of John Street West in the said Town of Georgetown distant 136.50 feet measured south-westerly along the said North-West limit from the point of intersection of the said North-West limit with the south-west limit of McNabb Street in the said Town of Georgetown.

THENCE South 38 deg. 38' 20" West, along the said North-West limit of John Street West 110.45 feet more or less to a point therein in the line of a fence running north-westerly;

THENCE North 51 deg. 17' 00" West, along the line of the said fence, 21.55 feet to a point therein;

THENCE North 41 deg. 29' 40" West, 168.13 feet more or less to a point in the line of a fence running north-easterly;

THENCE North 38 deg. 03' 25" East, along the line of the said fence running north-easterly, 7.49 feet more or less to the point of intersection of the line of the said fence with the line of a fence running north-westerly;

THENCE North 50 deg. 52' 10" West, along the line of the said fence running north-westerly, 45.22 feet to a point therein;

THENCE North 41 deg. 29' 40" West, 124.79 feet more or less to a point in the line of a fence marking the existing Southerly limit of the lands of The Canadian National Railway Company crossing part of the west half of said Lot 19;

NOTICE IS HEREBY also given that application has been made for approval to expropriate the land described as follows, as a temporary working easement for the purposes aforesaid for a period of one year from the date on which the construction and installation of the sewer aforesaid is commenced on the said lands.

ALL AND SINGULAR that certain parcel or tract of land and premises situate, lying and being in the Town of Georgetown in the County of Halton and Province of Ontario and being composed of part of the West Half of Lot 19 in Concession 9 in the Township of Esquesing now in the said Town of Georgetown, containing by admeasurement 0.007 acres be the same more or less and which said parcel of land is more particularly described as follows:

PREMISING that Guelph Street in the said town of Georgetown has a bearing of North 85 deg. 59' 30" West astronomical and relating all bearings herein thereto;

COMMENCING at a point in the west half of Lot 19 in said Concession 9 in the said Township now in the said Town of Georgetown which may be located as follows:

BEGINNING at the point of intersection of the South-west limit of McNabb Street with the North-west limit of John Street West in the said Town of Georgetown;

THENCE South 38 deg. 38' 20" West, along the said North-west limit of John Street West, 136.50 feet to a point therein;

THENCE North 44 deg. 18' 40" West, along a line drawn parallel to the aforesaid South-west limit of McNabb Street, 25.19 feet more or less to a point;

THENCE South 38 deg. 38' 20" West, along a line drawn parallel to the aforesaid North-west limit of John Street West and 25.00 feet in perpendicular distance measured north-westerly therefrom, 72.30 feet more or less to a point; said point being the aforesaid point of commencement of the herein described parcel of land;

THENCE South 38 deg. 38' 20" West, along the said parallel line, 10.15 feet to a point therein;

THENCE North 41 deg. 29' 40" West, 296.15 feet more or less to a point in the line of a fence marking the Southerly limit of the lands of The Canadian National Railway Company crossing part of the west half of said Lot 19;

THENCE South 84 deg. 38' 30" East, along the said southerly limit of the said lands of The Canadian National Railway Company as fenced, 5.23 feet more or less to an angle therein;

THENCE North 74 deg. 26' 00" East, along the said Southerly limit of the said lands of The Canadian National Railway Company as fenced, 7.14 feet more or less to a point therein;

THENCE South 41 deg. 29' 40" East, 287.47 feet more or less to the point of commencement.

Any owner of lands in respect of which notice is given who desires an inquiry into whether the taking of such land is fair, sound and reasonable necessary in the achievement of the objectives of the expropriating authority shall so notify the approving authority in writing.

(a) in the case of a registered owner, served personally or by registered mail within thirty days after he is served with the notice, or when he is served by publication, within thirty days after the first publication of the notice;

(b) in the case of an owner who is not a registered owner, within thirty days after the first publication of the notice.

The approving authority is: The Corporation of the Town of Georgetown Municipal Office, 36 Main St. N. Georgetown G. V. Faney, P. Eng. Town Engineer Agent for Expropriation Authority

NOTES: 1. The Expropriations Act, 1968 provides that,

(a) where an inquiry is requested, it shall be conducted by an inquiry officer appointed by the minister of Justice and Attorney General;

(b) the inquiry officer,

(i) shall give every party to the inquiry an opportunity to present evidence and argument and to examine and cross-examine witnesses, either personally or by his counsel or agent, and

(ii) may recommend to the approving authority that a party to the inquiry be paid a fixed amount for his costs of the inquiry not to exceed \$200 and the approving authority may in its discretion order the expropriating authority to pay such costs forthwith.

2. 'owner' and 'registered owner' are defined in the Act as follows:

'owner' includes a mortgagee, tenant, execution creditor, a person entitled to a limited estate or interest in land, a committee of the estate of a mentally incompetent person or of a person incapable of managing his affairs, and a guardian, executor, administrator or trustee in whom land is vested;

'registered owner' means an owner of land whose interest in the land is defined and whose name is specified in an instrument in the proper registry, land titles or sheriff's office, and includes a person shown as a tenant of land on the last revised assessment roll;

3. The expropriating authority, each owner who notifies the approving authority that he desires a hearing in respect of the lands intended to be expropriated and any owner added as a party by the inquiry officer are parties to the inquiry.
