

Touring Exhibition Promotes Elementary, High School Art

A touring art show, featuring work of students from kindergarten to Grade 13, will be exhibited throughout Halton County, starting today in Acton, and ending June 5th in Burlington.

Georgetown will host the show May 13th and 14th at the High School.

Chosen from every school in the county, 600 pieces of art were assembled by Creative Art Co-ordinator Ed Thorndyke and two art consultants, at Milton High School.

From this vast array of oil paintings, line drawings, sketches and collages, the number

was whittled down to 100 for the show. However, the remaining 50 have been photographed and will be shown at the same time, in a continuous coloured slide presentation.

All works by the students are

original, many vary from traditional to hard edge modern, with a few pop collages thrown in.

Even the posters and flyers are designed and printed by students, with the printing be-

ing done in the print shop at General Brock High School.

"It's an all-student effort," commented Ed Thorndyke, "and that's where the credit belongs."

teered to survey land and interview officials about Terra Cotta problems.

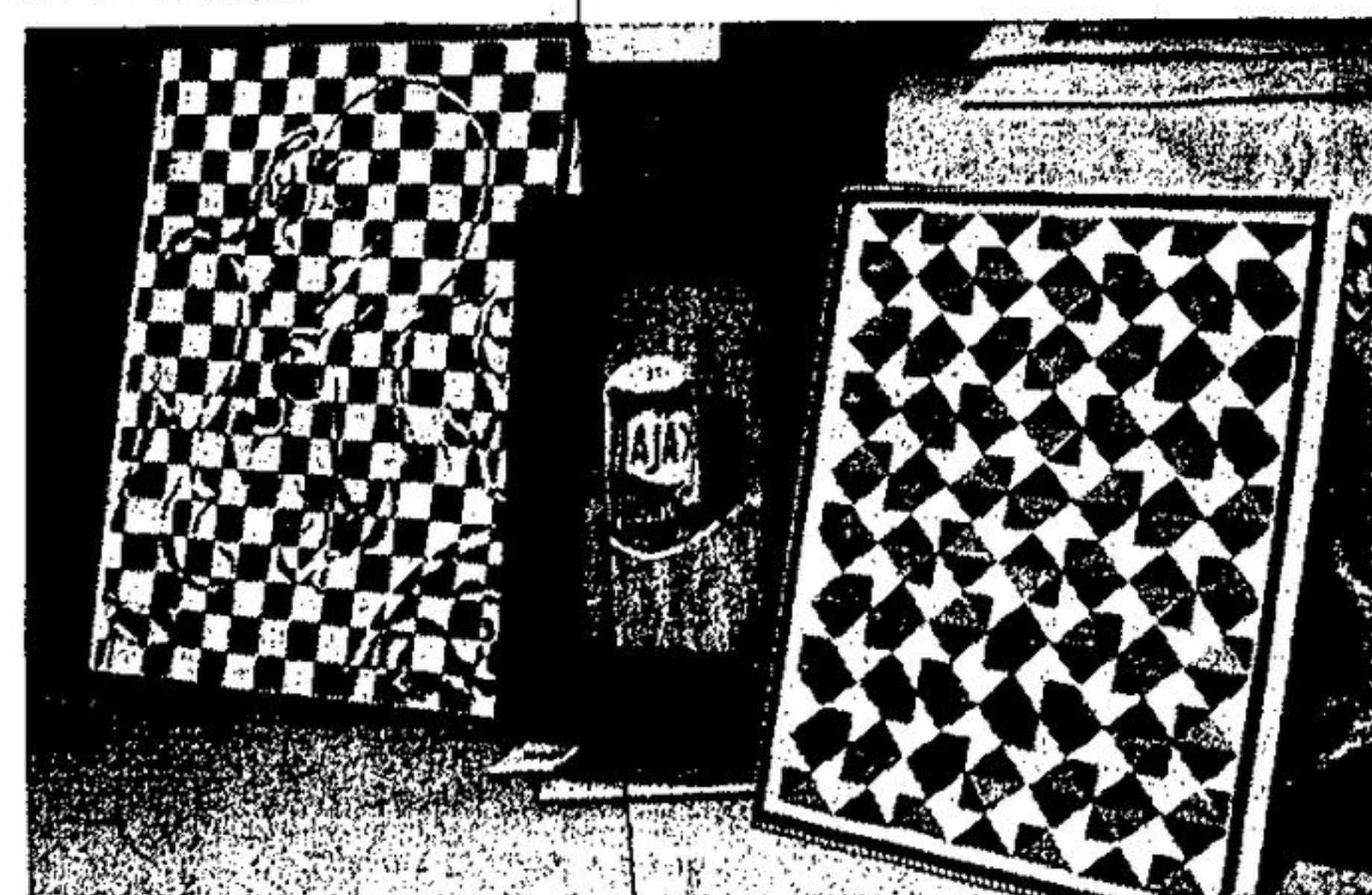
University is over for the term and the study will be an 'experiment — a sort of classroom in the field,' said Milus.
