# Eleven Found-Ins Plead Guilty, Drugs Liquor Case

Almost the entire docket at provincial court on Wednesday April 29 was taken up by names of persons charged with being found-ins in a Georgetown house raided by police January 31. Some 60 charges resulted from the liquor and drug raid.

Two persons were charged with giving, selling or supplying liquor to minors, while two others were charged with possession of marijuana and one with having LSD for the purpose of trafficking.

Judge Peter Wilch of Toronto was on the bench espec-

ially for this case. However, he found it necessary to remand most of the charges to May 28 when one of the four principal accused failed to appear in court.

**WARRANT ISSUED**  
The girl, aged 20, of no fixed address, failed to answer when called on a charge of supplying liquor to minors. A warrant has been issued for her arrest. A suggested trial date of May 28.

Charged with her on the same offence a Georgetown man in whose house the party

was being held, was remanded to the same date.

Another Georgetown man was remanded on four counts, two for being in possession of LSD for the purpose of trafficking, one for possession of marijuana and 1 for being a found-in.

One other Georgetown youth was charged with possession of marijuana and found-in.

**11 FINED**  
Of the 27 charged with being found-in, 11 entered pleas of

guilty and were each fined \$25 or 10 days in jail. Two failed to appear on the summonses, and warrants were issued for their arrest. Two others were remanded for proof of summons. The vast majority were teenagers.

Evidence was given during the hearing that 76 partly empty bottles of beer, two empty liquor bottles and two empty wine bottles were found when the house was raided.

Drugs were also found. A 14 year old picked up in the same raid was charged in Juvenile Court.

The party was broken up by a couple of squads of police officers from Georgetown Police Department, OPP and RCMP.

# Say Dumping Charges Increase Road Litter

A three woman deputation from Ashgrove Women's Institute, headed by Mrs. Cliff Hunter, appeared at last Monday night's meeting of Esqueping council to express their concern about increasing roadside litter and to protest the township's recently introduced dump charges.

## 600 FARMERS ARE ENROLLED IN CANFARM

A new national farm record system — Canfarm, is underway on a limited basis this year. Some 600 farmers throughout Ontario are enrolled — 10 in Halton County. Enrollment across Canada in 1970 is limited to 5,000 farmers to facilitate orderly implementation of this new system. The farmer records all receipts, expenses, capital, sales, purchases, etc., on a simple journal. Every item is identified by a code. The code indicates what the item is, whether it was purchased or sold, and the account with which it is associated. This information is mailed at the end of each month to the processing centre in Guelph where it is processed by computer. PROCESSED REPORTS The processed reports are mailed back to the farmer within a few days after the data arrives. These monthly reports contain information on each enterprise on the farm for that month and for the year to date. Annual reports include a cash income statement to assist in income tax returns, as well as the owner's equity statement and financial analysis of the business. The Extension Branch of the Ontario Department of Agriculture and Food in each county is responsible for servicing the people this year on Canfarm. Although it is impossible for any additional persons to enrol in 1970, names of those interested for 1971 should be sent to the Agricultural office.

"Whether we charge or not, there's always so much garbage dumped by the roadside," deputy-reeve Tom Hill pointed out.
