Await Kerr's Word on Bigger Conservation Grant

A Halton Region Conservation Authority bid for a reconsideration of the 1970 budget met with little success. Authority members learned Friday night.

Barrie Humphreys, chairman of the Authority, presented the problems caused by the budget cut to George Kerr, minister of Energy and Resources Management, in a meeting May 11.

PROMISED

"The minister promised to review the matter and reply as soon as possible," said Humphreys. But the Authority has not received the results of the minister's action on the mat-

ter. "We haven't enough capital for all our projects and it puts us in a 'bit of a box'."

"We have ample money if we don't let the contract on Hilton Falls, but we would need \$800,000 if we were to try and do everything we planned," he said.

PREPARED

According to Humphreys the Halton authority, while not the second largest authority, spent the second largest amount of money on projects last year.

"We are always prepared to spend money if it is good for our fellow man," he said.
