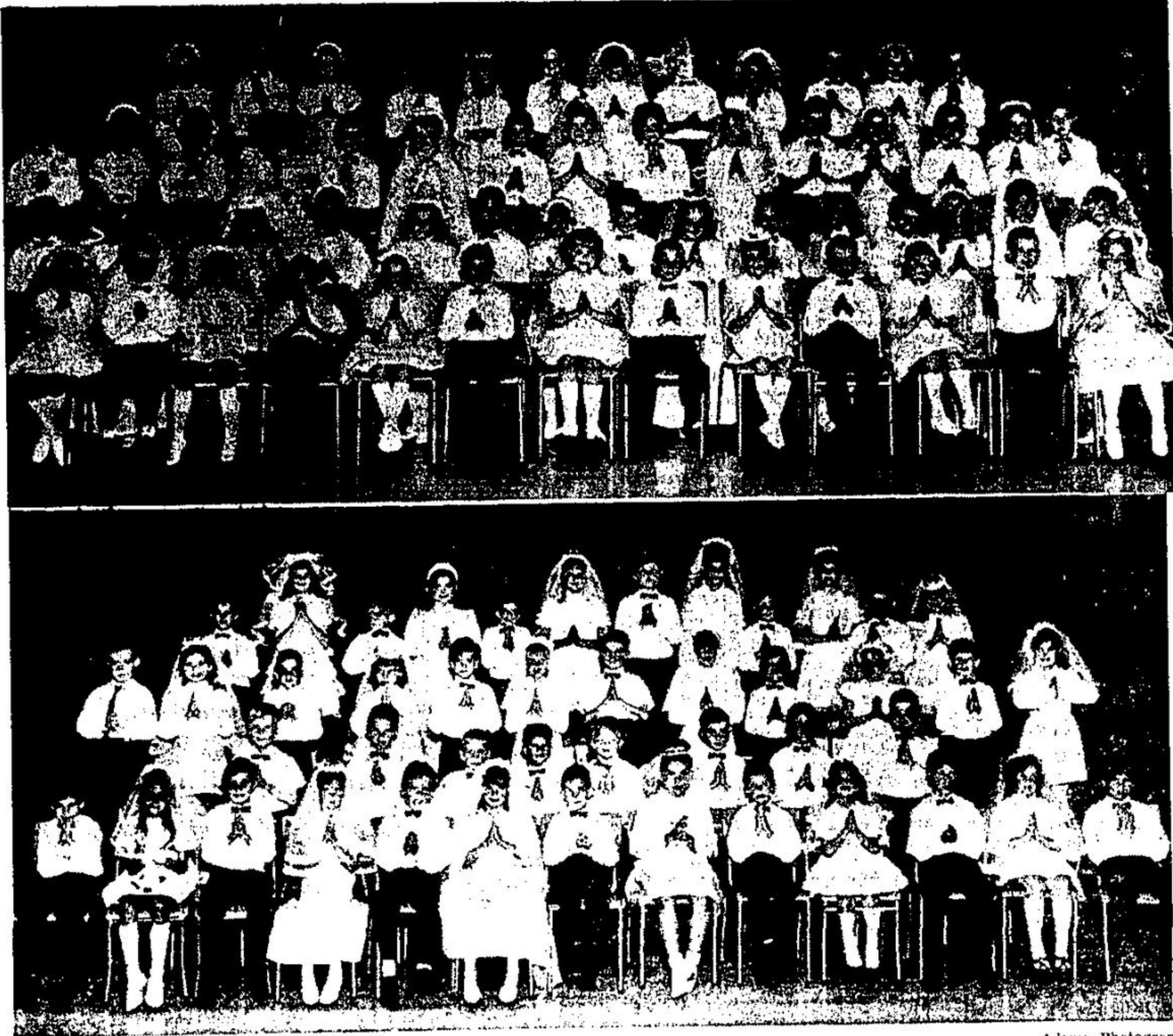

The Holland Liberation Committee put a great deal of effort and time into making the thank you Canada night a success. It was, in their view, and in mine, a very worthwhile effort.
