

# Finds Chemicals On Bruce Trail

North Halton OPP and Halton County Health Unit are investigating the type and danger of a quantity of chemicals found dumped along the Bruce Trail near Spycyde. Wilf Fortowsky, Hwy. 25, reported the incident to the OPP and the health unit and also to pollution fighter Mrs. Joyce Burton of 'Operation Survival.'

An acquaintance of Mr. Fortowsky was out walking on the weekend when he found the quantity of chemical compounds strewn along the Bruce Trail. He immediately alerted Mr. Fortowsky, fearing with all the rain on the weekend that the chemicals would seep into the wells of area homes.

"When we found the containers they had a tag on them with a company name attached. The police are in-

vestigating as to who would buy a chemical of this type. The investigation should more or less pinpoint the culprit," said Mr. Fortowsky.

Neil Pattullo, Halton County Health representative was called to the scene and took samples of the compounds. The compounds, varied in color and consistency; some were powdery, others coarse, said Mr. Fortowsky. Some of the labels said 'Dangerous if Taken Internally.'

Mr. Fortowsky intends to take action against the offender when his identity is known.

### Editor Wrong, Public is For Recreation Director

Dear Mr. Biehn:

I agree with the reader who criticized your editorial which said that council was split on hiring a recreation director. You inferred in that editorial that Georgetown is still divided as to whether this man should be hired. You continue this inference in your editorial of May 28. Just the opposite is true. The people are very much behind this move and never was it more apparent than at that council meeting which voted him into existence. It was an exciting meeting. The council did their homework well and each member voted with conviction. Two members, Cr. Ern Hyde and Reeve Hunter opposed the hiring and they gave good reasons. They pointed out that a recreation director costs money; that right now there is a good deal of recreation in this town such as soccer, hockey, baseball; that Stevenson and Kellogg recommended hiring a recreation director as an eventual, not an immediate necessity.

The other six council members considered these objections carefully but did not find them sufficient to change their votes.

Cr. Sandy Mackenzie pointed out that the actual cost to Georgetown would be small as the provincial government will subsidize the salary to the tune of \$2,000.

Cr. Ric Morrow said that we are burdening our children with enormous debentures for roads, etc., that they'll be paying for the rest of their lives — surely we can't begrudge a few pennies to provide them now with the same privileges as children from other areas.

Cr. Bill Smith agreed that there were organized games for certain age groups already in Georgetown, but recreation isn't just children playing baseball. Recreation is music, art, teen programs, adult education. It's council's duty to off-

er these to the ratepayers of this town.

Deputy Reeve Speight drew cheers from the gallery when he described how he had changed his mind from nay to yeah after going into the streets of Georgetown and talking to the citizens; he spoke with professional people, working people, housewives and students and he found 90% were very much in favour of hiring a recreation director.

Very pertinent, however, were the yes votes of Cr. Donna Demison and Cr. Harry Levy, the true 'heavies' in this issue. Mrs. Demison has done a tremendous amount of research into recreation generally and recreation specifically in Georgetown. Both she and Cr. Levy sit on the Georgetown Recreation Committee which council formed to carry out the recreation in this town. This committee is made up of very excellent and dedicated people, all volunteers who have one failing. They have only twenty-four hours in their day.

There is a tremendous amount of organizing, co-ordinating, planning involved in any recreation program. We at the YM-YWCA would collapse tomorrow without our salaried program director to keep continuous control of the fantastic details. I don't know how the GRC has lasted this long carrying a load thrice the size of the Y. I believe that hiring a director immediately is essential for the GRC to survive.

I'm quite sure your critical reader was not upset by your views, i.e., that you agree with the two opposing council members and the mayor. After all, this is the stuff of democracy. What does disturb, however, is that by omission, you imply in your editorials that this was a hasty, ill-thought out 'split' vote.

I was there. It wasn't.
