**Victoria Nurses Get \$1,000 County Grant**

Halton County Council has agreed to grant \$1,000 to the Victorian Order of Nurses.

Since September, 1969, the nurses have been operating in the northern part of the county, an area that is not covered by the United Appeal, and have suffered a net deficit of \$2,500 as a result of relying only on patient fees.

**APPEAL FOR FUNDS**

The addition of another nurse and the purchase of a staff car for her to use in the northern part of the county also contributed to the deficit.

An appeal for funds was originally presented to the county's social and family services committee May 19th and it was Georgetown's Deputy Reeve Art Speight who prepared the grant.

Committee chairman Milton Reeve Ron Harris told council last Saturday he felt the budget could afford the \$1,000 grant. Cost of caring for indigent patients had dropped enough to allow for the expenditure, he noted.

A levy of 10 cents per person in the north part of the county would give the VON \$4,000, claimed Georgetown Reeve W. Hunter, as a point of information. He explained the idea of the ten cents per person levy was introduced at Georgetown council meeting Monday night.

**'Insulted' Teachers Reject Wage Offer**

Halton County's 325 separate school teachers and principals have rejected the Catholic school board's latest wage offer.

The teachers said the reasons for rejecting the offer were irregular increment patterns, no increase in fringe benefits, unfair treatment to teachers with special talent qualifications and specialized training.

**BY PASSED**

"It was felt the board insulted the teachers by sending them the board's final offer in a personal letter, by-passing the negotiation committee chosen by the teachers to represent them."

The teachers passed a motion of confidence in the negotiation committee.

**UNFAIR**

The teachers say the dispute is not over salaries, but over fringe benefits and unfair treatment to teachers with special talents, qualifications and specialized training.

However, they have indicated they still want to go back to the board and negotiate.

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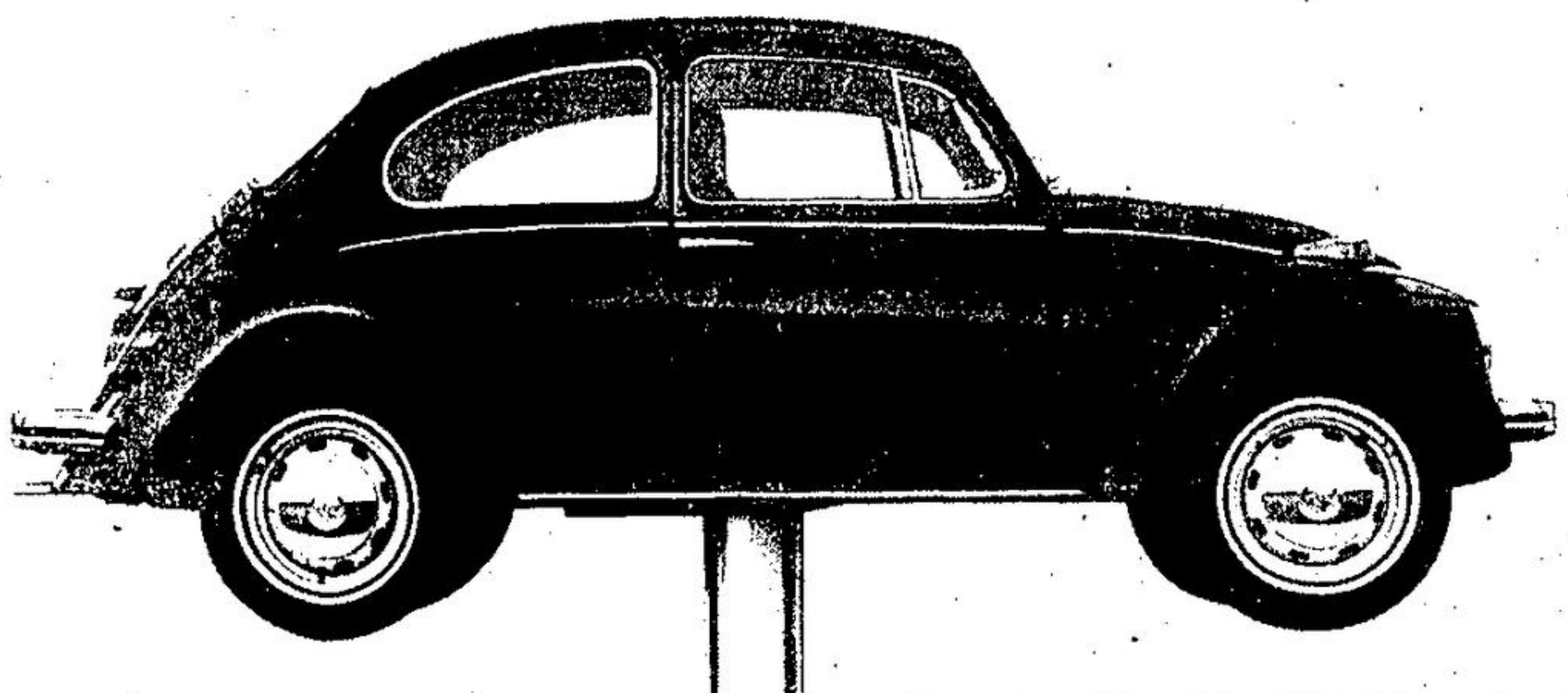
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**GRADE 13 PRIVATE STUDY CANDIDATES**

Any person wishing to write a Grade 13 examination as a private study candidate must inform the principal of his local high school of his intention by June 8th. The school will advise him of the time, place and nature of the examination. Should the paper that he wishes to write not be written in his local high school he will be advised where such an examination is to be held. A fee of \$5 will be charged for each examination written.
