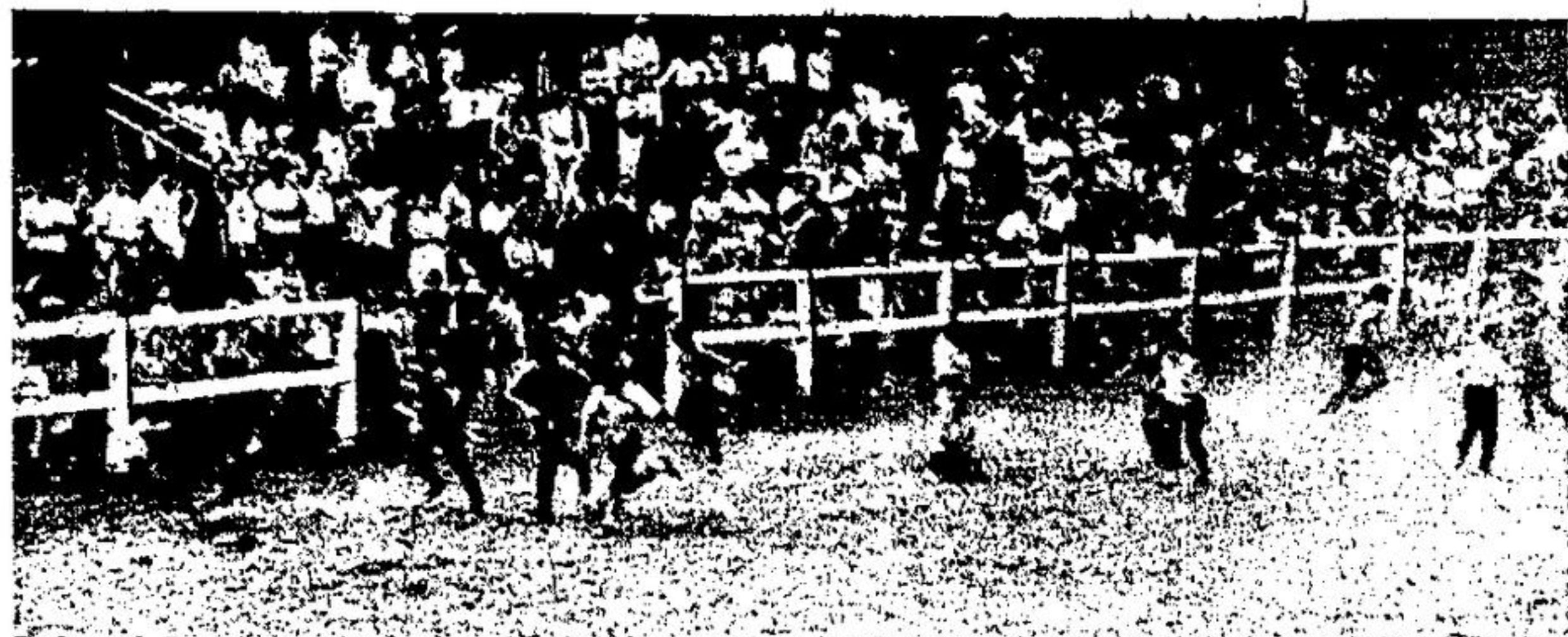


# The Hazards of Horsing Around

Miss Jean Mackenzie will be the delegate for this convention and Miss Olive Logan will attend as an observer.

Miss Elizabeth Buck installed the officers for the 1970-71 terms, with the impressive candlelight ceremony. Members were encouraged with a release received from the Canadian Federation wherein it stated that the subject of the federation's brief alleging discrimination against Canada Pension plan contributors who die without leaving a spouse should be removed by providing a more equitable return of contributions to the deceased contributor's dependents or estate and the resolution asking that consideration be given for tax exemption for working women who must employ the services of others to maintain a home for themselves and their dependents, was being studied by the House of Commons and that in the Benson white paper paragraphs 27 and 28 on Tax Reform that a parent would be allowed to deduct expenses incurred for child care up to a maximum of \$500 per child and not exceeding \$2,000 per family.
