Rud Whiting, Liberal MP for Halton riding, said Monday night that he is only wholly committed to one proposal in the Benson White Paper on Taxation.

"I want to see the elimination of taxes for people in very low income groups," he said. Whiting also said that he wanted to see death duties eliminated in the event that capital

gains are taxed. The MP addressed an audience of 14 at the Milton Credit Union hall, by invitation of the local chapter of the Imperial Order of the Daughters of the Empire.

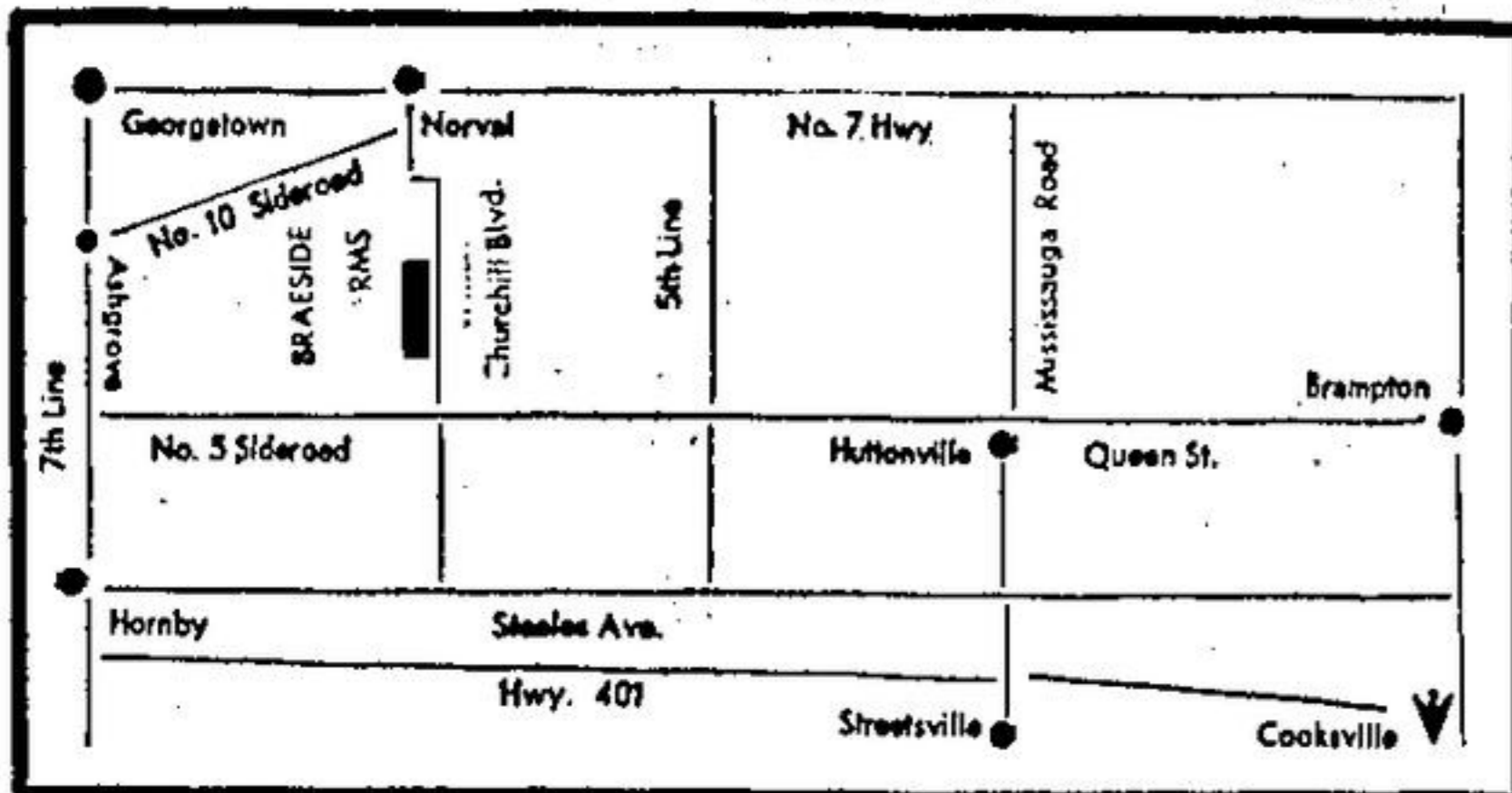
