Candy striper duties are many and varied. They perform duties such as bed making, hair grooming for the older patients, keeping fresh cool water on the bedside tables, arranging flowers, feeding children and in general being a junior helper under the supervision of the nursing staff. As the girls build

up their record of voluntary hours, the receive after 50 hours their cap, after 100 hours their stripe, after 200 hours their pin and a new award offered within the past few months a bar for the pin when 400 hours are completed. If on leaving the candy stripe program a girl has donated 500 hours, she receives a certificate.
