

In 1971 Halton County Schools should have a specified course in environmental studies.

According to Phil Kettle of the Halton County Board of Education a group of teachers and administrators, as part of the Geography council are working on it.

REAL INSIGHT

"It will give the students a real insight into what pollution is and also concentrate on conservation of the environment," he said.

The course would be gear. ed for grades 11 and 12 but they are also planning to create units of study for teachers of the younger grades. These units could be taught as a block or as Kettle would prefer to see, spread throughout the year.

EXPAND IT

"Most teachers are doing it now" said Kettle. "We just want to expand it and provide research materials they could use."

He said the teachers would be drawn from different subjects, not just geography Since it will be an interdisciplinary subject, science, home economics, shop and even English teachers will help out. He said some poems written on pollution would be important as well as the Home Ec. teacher showing how the house-wife pollutes.

DECISION

The decision to have a course in environmental studies started when the Board passed a resolution in November 1969, that there should be a water pollution course.

Kettle, at that time, started to investigate what was going on in pollution research across the county.

TEXT BOOKS

"I suggested they widen the idea of water pollution to a more comprehensive course," he said.

He said work will continue on it this summer and jobs is choosing the text books and the supplementary reading.
