DIRECTIVE

Because of so much speculation, conjecture, and guessing about fraternal affiliates, Ontario Provincial president Doug McDonald has issued a directive to all branches which appears below in its entirety.

The recent 23rd biennial convention approved the following proposals and they now become a convention mandate.

Any command or branch in the Royal Canadian Legion may only have as members, those who are duly constituted in the Dominion by-laws, and they are life, ordinary, associate, and honorary. And further, by the autonomous decision of first the provincial command and secondly the autonomous decision of a branch, they shall be allowed to have a total of no more than 30% fraternal affiliates based on current membership totals of the existing life, ordinary and associate members.

NO ACTION

I wish to direct each branch at this time to take no action in this particular situation until such time as it has been dealt with at the forthcoming provincial convention to be held at Waterloo in the month of May, 1971, and the decision of the Executive Committee.

May Add Environmental Studies Course in Halton

In 1971 Halton County Schools should have a specified course in environmental studies.

According to Phil Kettle of the Halton County Board of Education a group of teachers and administrators, as part of the Geography Council are working on it.

REAL INSIGHT

"It will give the students a real insight into what pollution is and also concentrate on conservation of the environment," he said.

The course would be geared for grades 11 and 12 but they are also planning to create units of study for teachers of the younger grades. These units could be taught as a block or as Kettle would prefer to see, spread throughout the year.

EXPAND IT

"Most teachers are doing it now" said Kettle. "We just want to expand it and provide research materials they could use."

He said the teachers would be drawn from different subjects, not just geography. Since it will be an interdisciplinary subject, science, home economics, shop and even English teachers will help out. He said some po-

shall be made at that time if the Ontario Command shall embrace fraternal affiliates.

Trustee Critical, Says Teacher Salaries High

A Halton school board trustee was critical last week of teacher contract settlements that pushed the board's budget up \$2,000,000 for the 1970-71 school year. R. E. Goodin, made his criticism when the board was asked to approve the new contract for secondary school teachers in the county. The \$2,000,000 figure includes elementary and secondary teachers, he said.

EXAMPLES

"Someone must say no," he told the board. The minister of education said trustees must hold the line, and as a public servant "we should

be setting examples," Goodin said. Liberty Peace, chairman of the board's salary negotiation committee, defended the agreement with secondary school teachers. He said the agreement was close to the budgeted amounts and below the inflationary guidelines set by the province.

Other members pointed out that the 9.5 per cent increase given to secondary school teachers included the annual increment. Without the increment, the actual increase would be closer to 3 1/2 to 5 per cent, it was indicated.

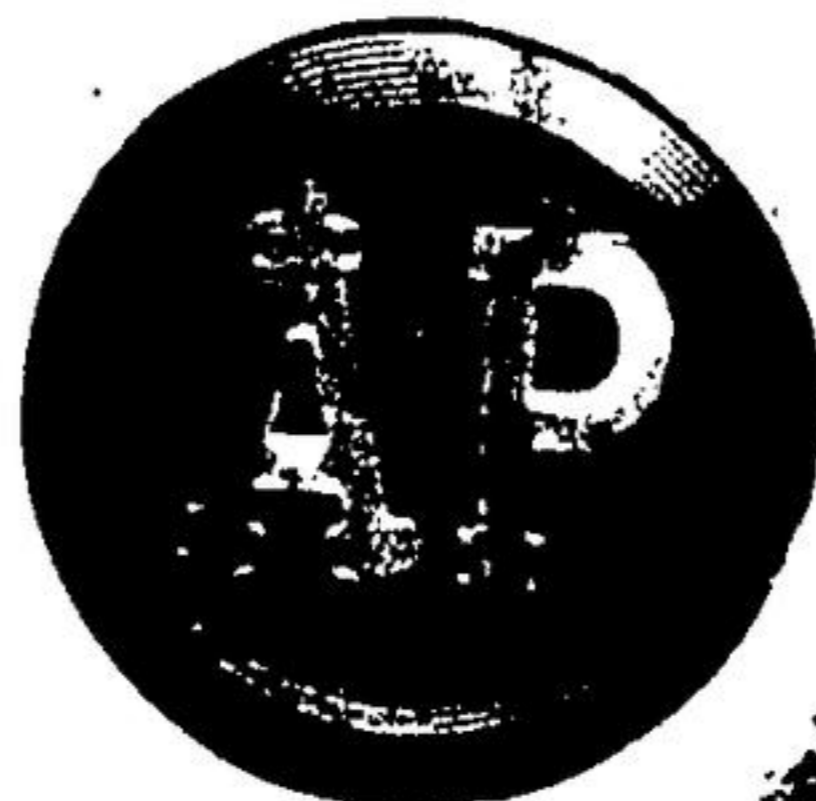
