

Gravestones Form Cairn, Pioneer Burial Ground

A cairn composed of the gravestones in the historic Providence burial ground at the corner of the Ballinafad side-road and the 9th Line was dedicated in a special memorial service at the site recently.

Rev. Kelvin Johnston of Georgetown conducted the service which was attended by relatives of pioneers buried there from all over southern Ontario and the United States.

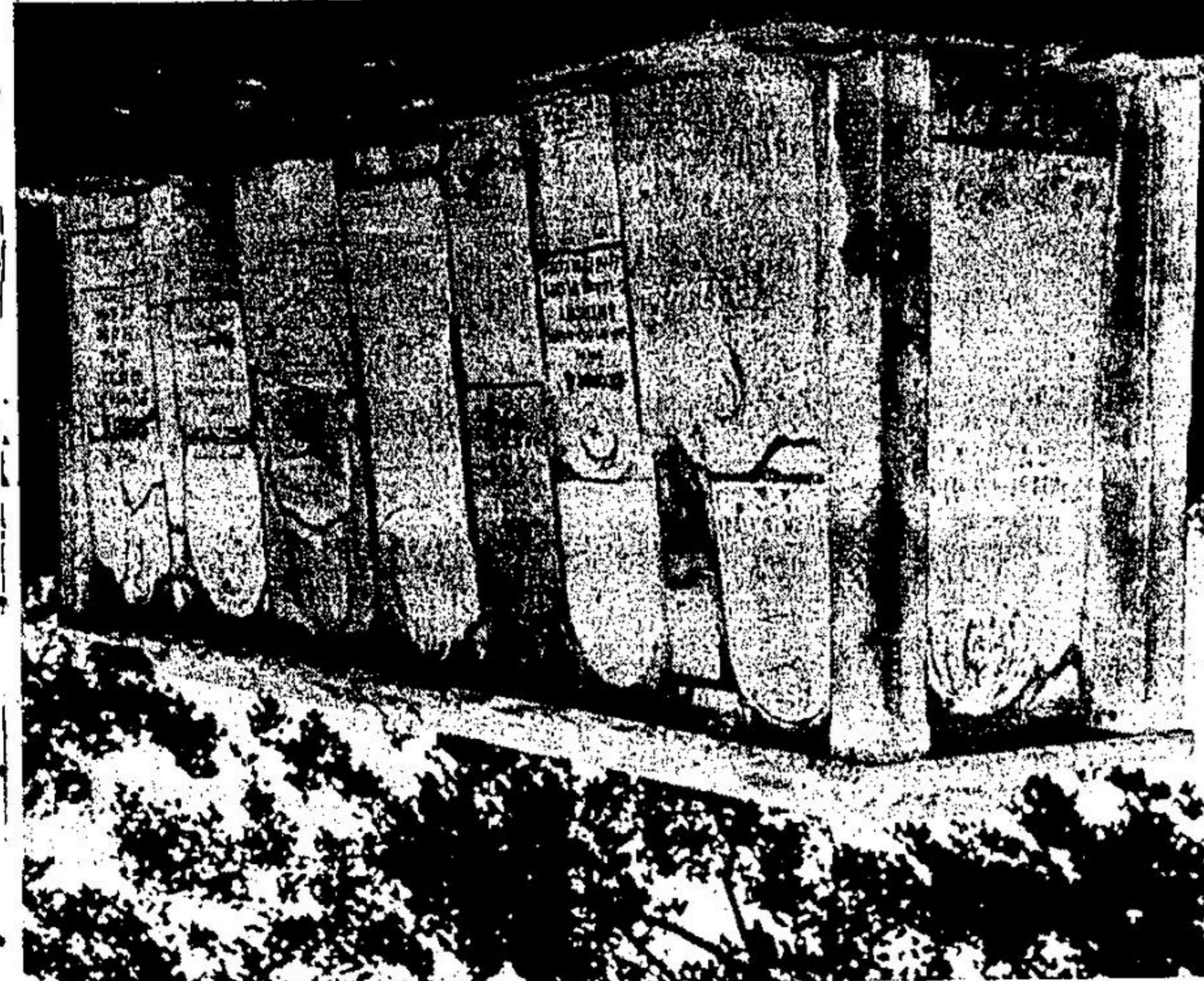
Robert McEnery of R.R. 1, Georgetown unveiled the cairn which was built by Gene Logan of Ballinafad. Mrs. Jesse McEnery and Mrs. Bill McLean of the Ballinafad W. I. unveiled the plaque on the restored gate.

Still to be installed on the cairn is a plaque donated by Georgetown Jeweller John Boughton who lives at Ballinafad. It was the Ballinafad W.I. who initiated the restoration of the burial ground three years ago as a centennial year project.

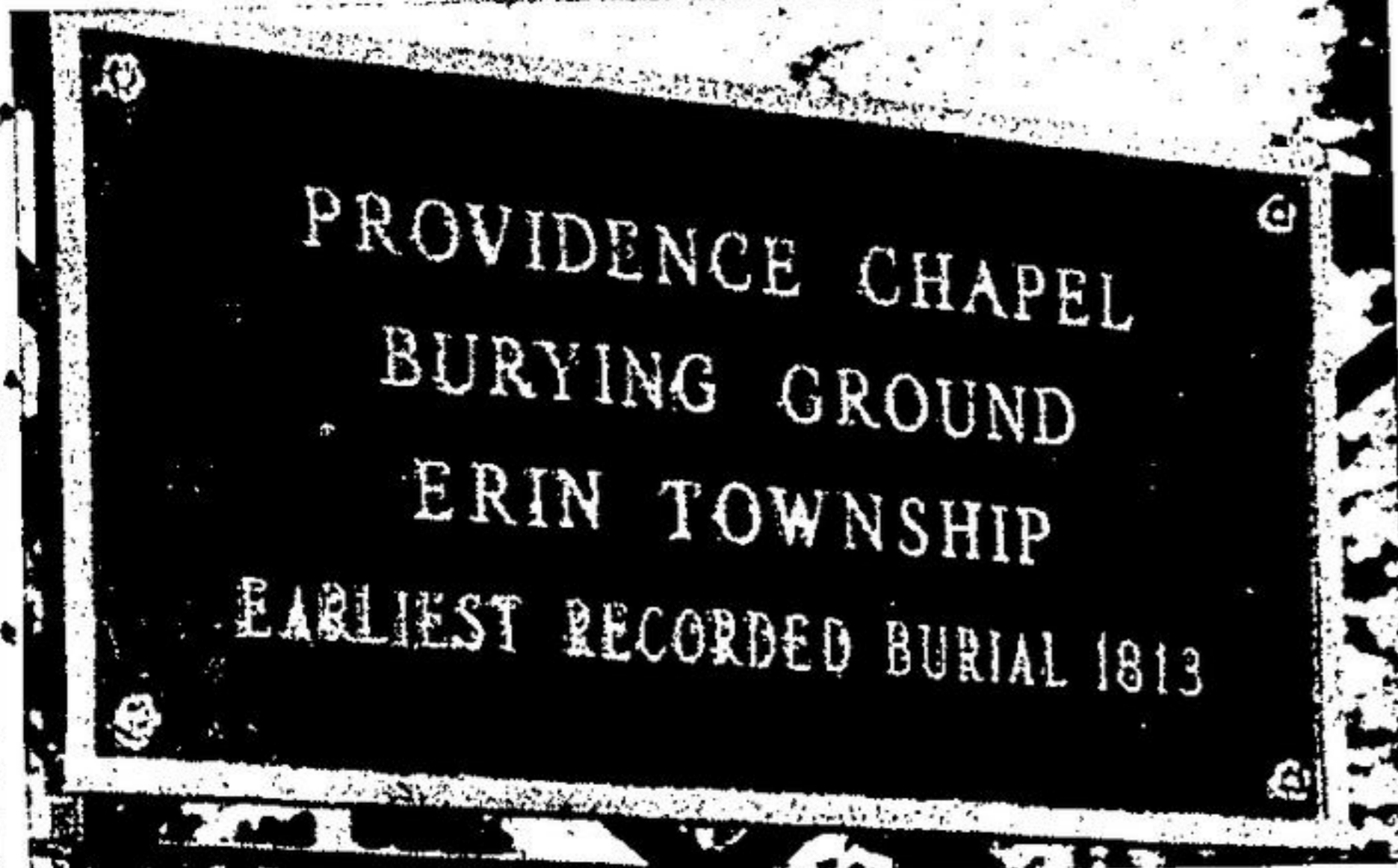

The gravestones are all that remain of Providence Chapel and church yard which used to be visited by travelling preachers in the 1800's. First burial in the cemetery was in 1813 and the last in 1962.

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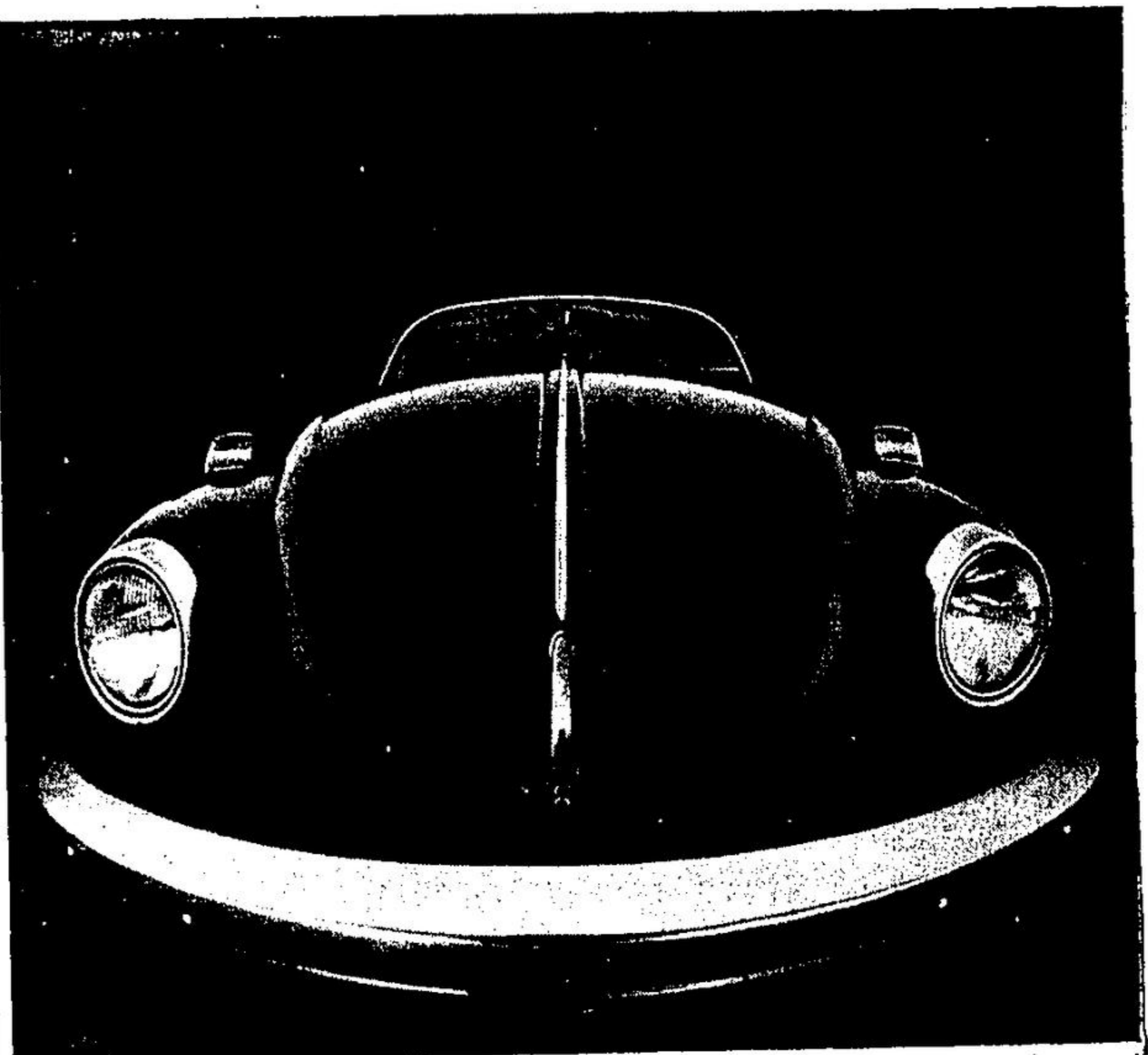
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
