No Halton Deer Hunting Fear Danger to Homes

There will be no deer hunting in Halton county this year.

County Council last Tuesday adopted a recommendation brought to them by the Agriculture, Emergency Measures Organization and Planning Committee that there be no hunt.

Nassagaweya's Deputy Reeve Gordon Agnew said in an interview after council that the measure was adopted because of the increasing danger to rural homeowners from stray shots from the rifles of deer hunters.

LIKE IT KEPT OPEN

"At our committee meeting J. J. Armstrong from the Department of Lands and Forests explained the deer situation to us," Agnew said, "and it indicated he would like to see the season kept open, even if it was declared for bow hunting only."

"But I must be the only person in Halton to have a hunting bow," he added.

Nassagaweya, last fall, was vocally opposed to hunting of any sort within the township because council members said they felt it was too dangerous to allow hunters to roam through the farm land which is quickly being built up.

A BLOW TO SOME

Ken Lewis, of the Halton Sportsmen's Association, said this week the cancellation will be a blow to some hunters.

"Some men can't get up north to hunt deer and have in past years hunted for deer in the county. It won't hurt our club much though because we're mostly moose hunters."
