The Guides of the 6th and 7th Guide Companies, led by Captain Mrs. Colleen Cruickshank formed a choir, and Rev. Kelvin Johnston opened the service with a prayer.

Re the 'Notice of application by the corporation of Georgetown to disburse with a vote of the electors' in The Georgetown Herald, about the reconstruction of various streets in Georgetown for the sum of \$720,000.

I object to the plan to disburse with a vote of the electors in this matter. There is no justification, in my opinion, for spending the staggering sum of \$720,000 to provide more room and comfort to the motor car which is, as we have unfortunately found out, one of the main pollutants of our air.

In any event, the people living on the streets singled out for reconstruction should have the opportunity to either say 'yes' or 'no' to the cutting down of trees and destruction of their neighbourhood.

And we all should be asked if we are willing to spend \$720,000 of our hard earned tax money to provide streets beyond all need and reason.

I ask the council of the town of Georgetown not to fall victim to a dangerous and wasteful idea of progress. We are in the middle of a serious recession. To spend money in such a reckless fashion will not get us out of it.
