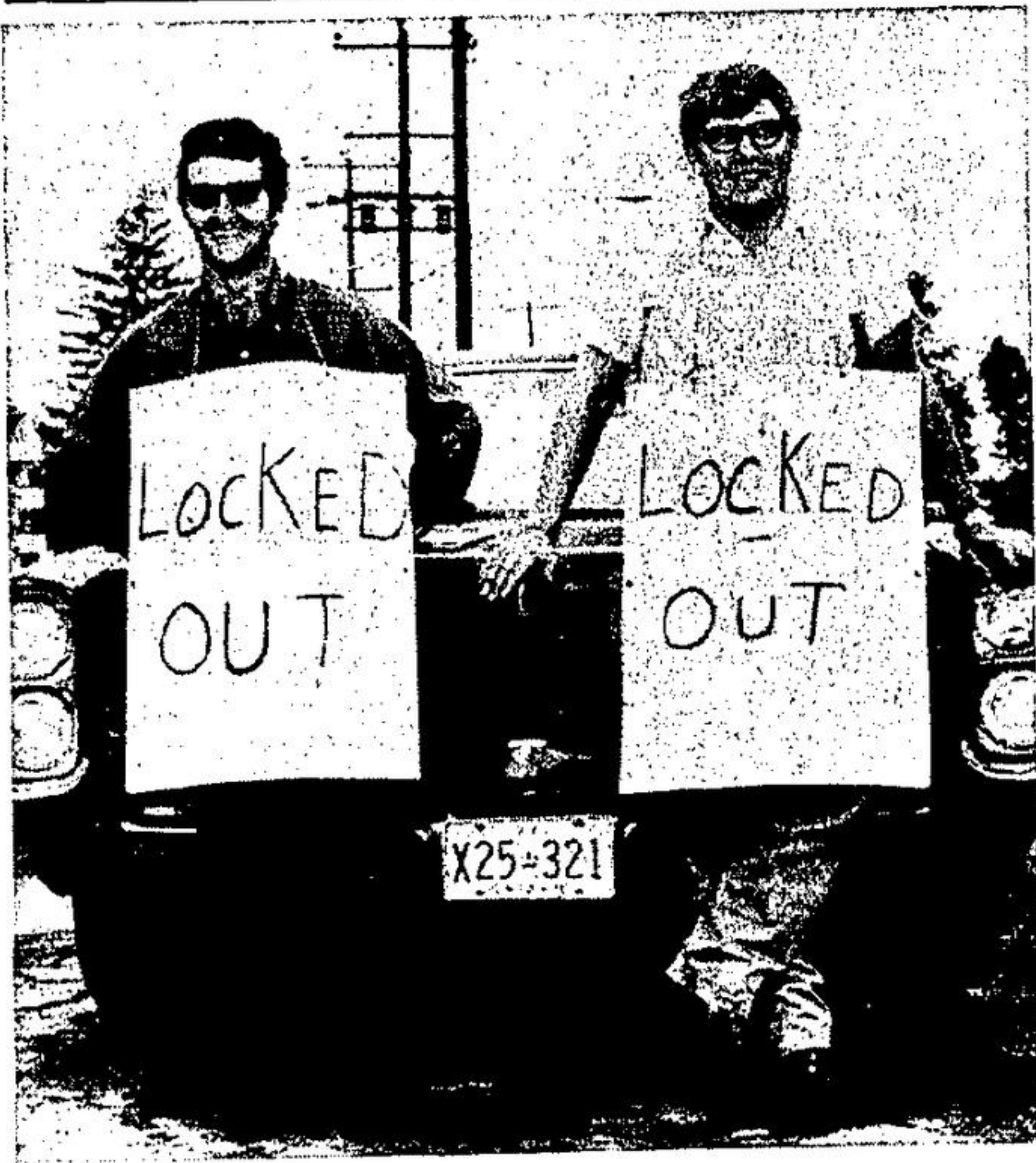

One hundred and nine people died in the flaming crash which left twisted metal scattered over a farmer's field. But surprisingly the mail bag containing the letter was intact.
