Mrs. Wold Came Here As Bride From Norway

The death of Dagny Elstad, wife of Trygve Wold, of 54 Maple Ave. W. occurred suddenly on Monday, June 29, following a visit to her husband in hospital. She had been in failing health for more than a year.

Mrs. Wold came to Canada as a bride in 1931 from her native Norway. On two occasions only she returned home for a visit. In 1937, when she travelled alone by sea, and in 1948, when her husband accompanied her. After her return in 1937 she entertained local societies with stories of Norway.

Her main interests were home and friends and she will be remembered as a most capable and gracious hostess. Only outside the home activities, which involved her husband, claimed much of her attention. She was an enthusiastic golfer in her younger years, and a member of the now North Halton Golf Club. For many years she lived on Albert Street, until

moving to the present home on Maple Avenue.

Mrs. Wold is also survived by two sisters and a brother in Norway. Mrs. Aasta Oyen of Bergen, Mrs. Guri Melon of Oslo, and Gunnar Elstad of Trondheim. Also five nephews one of whom, Henri Melon, resides in Toronto with his wife and three sons.

Funeral service was held at the Harold C. McClure Funeral Home on Friday afternoon, July 3 at 2 p.m. with the Rev. John Kilfiner of the Immanuel Lutheran Church officiating. Cremation followed, and interment will be in Mrs. Wold's mother's graveyard in Hurum Chuchyard (near Oslo) Norway.

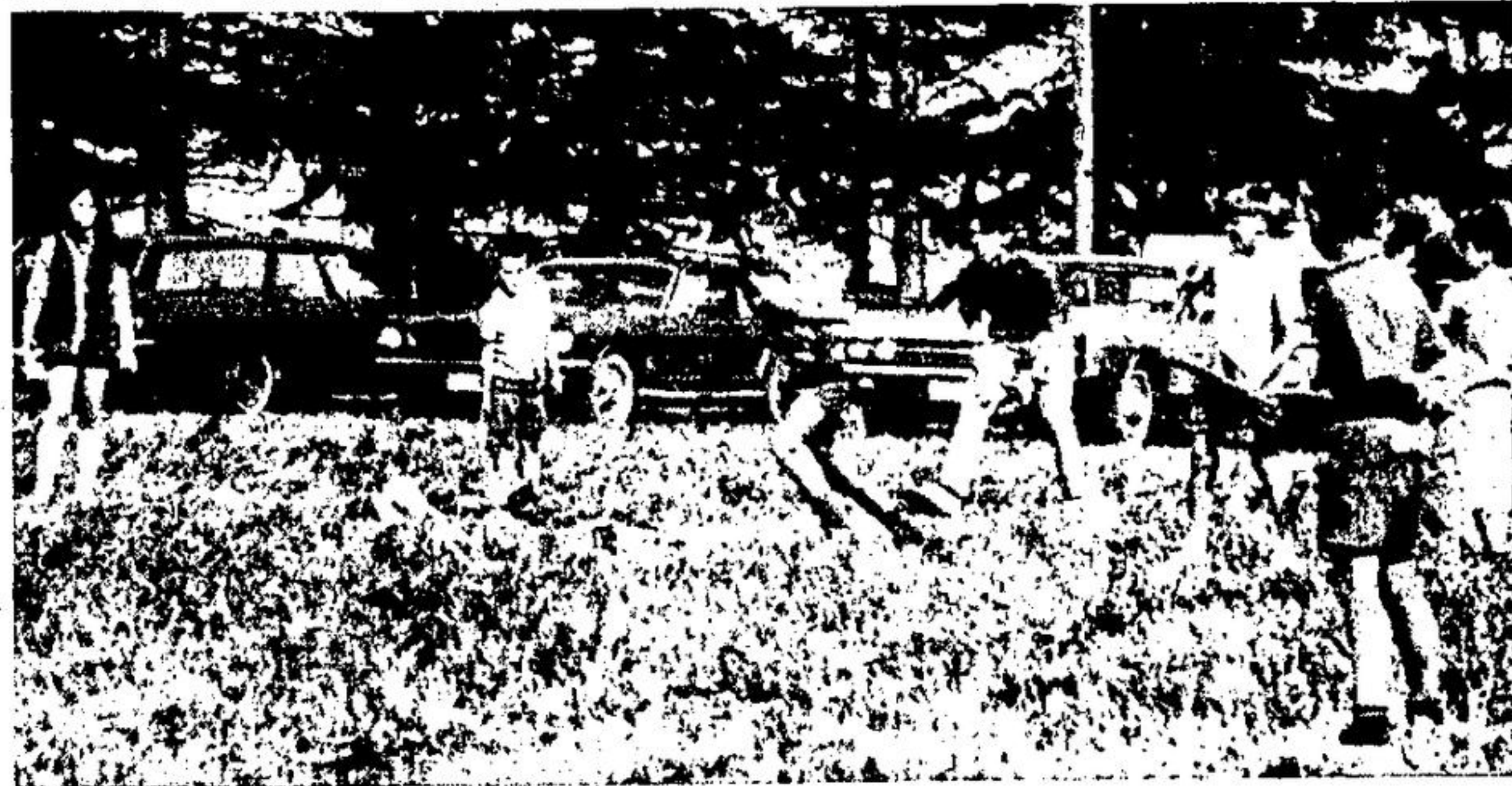

Suspend Sentence, But Charge Second Theft

A Georgetown youth received a suspended sentence on one charge of breaking and entering but was remanded in custody with bail set at \$1,000 on a second charge of theft over \$50. The sixteen year old received

a suspended sentence along with a Georgetown 17 year old and both were subjected to a 12 month probationary period.

They were convicted June 17 of breaking and entering at Masson Motors on Guelph St. in Georgetown. They were remanded until last week for sentencing.

In suspending the sentence

Judge J. R. Black, said that the youth had to make every effort to join the Lorne Scots Regiment's summer camp program. He is a member of the Georgetown detachment.

He then appeared to answer a charge of theft over \$50.


Assistant crown attorney Murray Roulston pointed out that he had been brought back

from Winnipeg at considerable cost to the crown to answer the charge and said he believed "bail should be set at a substantial amount."

The case was set over to August 26.

ONTARIO

AN ACT TO PROVIDE FOR THE PRESERVATION OF THE NIAGARA ESCARPMENT AND ITS VICINITY

TAKE NOTICE

That no mining, quarry or pit operations may be conducted in the protected zone noted below until the operator has first obtained a permit to conduct such operations from the Minister of Mines and Northern Affairs; except that where such mine was in operation prior to June 26, 1970 the requirement shall not apply until 90 days from that date.

The operators' application for the permit must be accompanied by complete data on the proposed operations as stipulated in Section 4 of the Act.

The Protected Zone applies to lands as designated by regulations under the Act in the geographic Townships of Niagara, Stamford, Grantham, Thorold, Pelham, Leith, Clinton, North Grimsby, Solihull, Barrow, Ancaster, Beverly, West Flamborough, East Flamborough, Nelson, Massagoway, Exeter, Erin, Chinguacousy, Colborne, Albion, Mono, Adjala, Mukmar, Osprey, Northwest, Collingwood, Armentia, Euphrasia, St. Vincent, Holland, Sydenham, Derby, Keppel, Sarawak, Amabel, Altonville, Easton, Lindsay and St. Edwards.

Notwithstanding that a permit has been issued under the Act, no person shall quarry in the Amabel or Lockport Formation in the Protected Zone of a point nearer to the natural edge of the Niagara Escarpment than 300 feet measured horizontally.

Every person who contravenes Sections 3 or 9 or fails to comply with the terms and conditions of a permit is guilty of an offence against this Act and is liable to a fine of not more than \$5,000 for every day upon which the offence occurs or continues.
