AN ACT TO PROVIDE FOR THE PRESERVATION OF THE MAGARA ESCARPMENT AND ITS VICINITY

TAKE NOTICE

That no mining, quarry or pit operations may be conducted in the protected zone noted below until the operator has first obtained a permit to conduct such operations from the Minister of Mines and Northern Affairs; except that where such mine was in operation prior to June 26, 1970 the requirement shall not apply until 90 days from that date.

The operators' application for the permit must be eccompanied by complete data on the proposed operation as stipulated in Section 4 of

The Protected Zone applies to lands as designated by regulations under the Act in the geographic Townships of Niagara, Stamford, Gronthom, Thorold, Pelham, Louth, Clinton, North Grimsby, Solifleet, Barton, Ancaster, Beverly, West Flamborough, East Flamborough, Nolson, Massagaweya, Esquesing, Erin, Chinguacousy, Caledon, Albion, Mono, Adjala, Mulmur, Osprey, Notlawasaga, Callingwood, Artemesia, Euphrasia, St. Vincent, Holland, Sydenham, Derby, Keppel, Sarawak, Amobel, Albermorie, Eastnor, Lindsay and St. Edmands.

Notwithstanding that a permit has been issued under the Act, no person shall quarry in the Amobel or Lockport Formation in the Protected Zone of a point nearer to the natural edge of the Niagara Escarpment than 300 feet measured harizontally. Every person who contravenes Sections 3 or 9 or fails to comply with

the terms and conditions of a permit is guilty of an offence against this Act and is liable to a fine of not more than \$5,000 for every day upon which the offence occurs or continues.
