May I also point out that the siren has been removed from

the 1967 Cadillac ambulance & replaced with a two tone horn. The two tone horn is going to be used exclusively on ambulances in Ontario and most ambulances in Ontario have been equipped with the same.

Perhaps the Herald became confused by the fact that both the new fire truck and new ambulance are both Ford products.

The sound of the siren on the fire truck and the two tone horn on the ambulance are electronically reproduced. And both vehicles can operate their two way radios through the loud speakers of their respective warning devices.

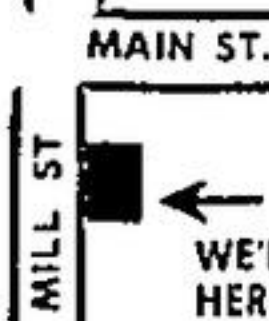
