Seeking Contract, Nurses Greylist Peel Health Unit

Peel County Health Unit has been greylisted — meaning registered nurses will be encouraged not to take jobs with it.

The greylisting by the Registered Nurses' Association of Ontario, stems from a contract dispute between the nurses and the board which has been continuing since last Dec. 2.

There are two vacancies on the county's usual staff of 30 nurses, but the association will tell nurses not to take jobs there until the dispute has been settled.

The nurses' association of the Peel health unit voted last week to strike, the second time in two months that such action was taken. May 11 was date of the first strike vote and the recent vote was merely a confirmation of that decision.

The association began negotiations for a new contract 29 days before its collective bargaining agreement expired Dec. 31, and since then have been carrying on negotiations.

In May the nurses requested that the matter be placed in the hands of an arbitrator. Under this process, both the nurses and the unit would have to accept the decision of the arb-

itrator, but the unit denied the request. Since Dec. 2 the nurses have

lowered their demands and the unit has increased its offer so that the two sides are now only \$125 a year apart on the question of minimum salary.

The minimum now is \$6,250 and the nurses are asking for a minimum of \$6,875. The health board is offering \$6,750 for the

first year and \$7,225 for the second year.


