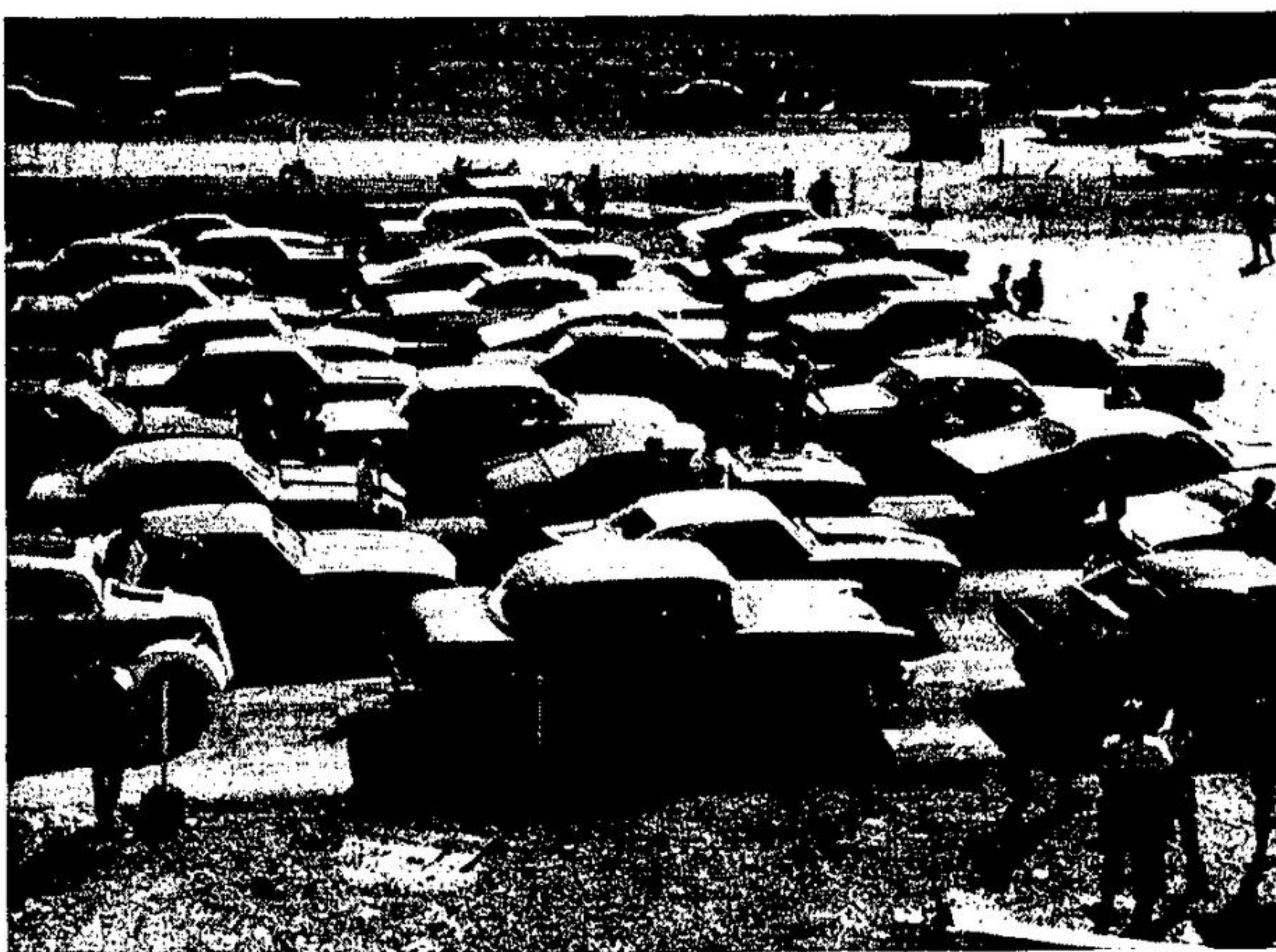


Esquering's Dilemma

No Enforcement For Drag Control By-Law

Esquering council found themselves in a dilemma Monday night, when complaints by Dave Craig and Peter Bowman about the Golden Horseshoe Dragway, showed they had a by-law controlling the operation. Let no one to enforce it.

Deputy reeve Tom Hill pointed out that the OPP will not enforce municipal by-laws, except those concerned with traffic.

AFTER DEADLINE
The decision arose when Dave Craig of the 4th Line claimed the Golden Horseshoe Dragway was racing after the 11:30 p.m. deadline set by the by-law. "What assurance have we that this will be stopped," he asked.

The deputy reeve offered Mr. Craig the job of enforcement officer for the township. "You would be paid out of the fines," he added.

When Reeve George Currie pointed out that witnesses prepared to swear the racing went on past the time limit were necessary to prosecute, an interpretation of the word racing ensued.

COULD BE AMENDED
The deputy reeve stated the by-law could be amended to say all cars must be off the drag strip by 11:30 whether or not they are racing. He also suggested the hiring of an off-duty officer to act as an enforcement officer should be investigated.

Later in the meeting a motion was passed instructing the clerk to write the Golden Horseshoe Dragway, telling of the complaints and pointing out that the by-law would be amended if the hours of operation were not obeyed.
