

# Football Rebs To Compete This Year With Oakville

Oakville's four high schools will have a tough new conference rival this fall. Georgetown Rebels, with a solid winning tradition on football and wrestling, are the newest members of the Halton East conference of the new Halton-Peel sports setup.

**SWITCH OVER**  
Georgetown switches over from the Central Western Ontario Secondary Schools Association with the redrawing of boundary lines for the new Halton-Peel setup.

A second high school, Acton also falls within those boundary lines but they're too small to compete with Oakville and Burlington schools in most major sports and so will continue in CWOSSA.

**LEAVE SOSSA**  
Milton became part of an Oakville conference in Zone One of the Southern Ontario Secondary Schools Association in 1968. Those high schools and four Burlington schools all leave SOSSA for Halton-Peel this fall.

The Oakville schools, are White Oaks, Perdue, Oakville-Trafalgar and Blakelock.

**MUSHROOMED**  
Former Georgetown athletic director Lyn McLaren switches to Burlington as a vice-principal this fall, but he watched his school mushroom into athletic prominence after he came here in 1959. He'll be replaced by Dan Patterson.

In that first year, Georgetown had just 375 students. Last year, the school had an enrolment of roughly 1,400, according to McLaren, a former Halton County Senior League baseball star.

**CONTENDER**  
The school's senior football team was a perennial contender in a conference that included four Guelph high schools. In their last half dozen years, they finished first once and tied for first twice.

Last year the Rebels finished third in the five team group. The junior team finished second in a five team grouping.

**EVEN STRONGER**  
Georgetown's wrestling tradition is even stronger. They capped off four straight years of winning the CWOSSA wrestling crown by finishing second in all-Ontario competition.
