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Shelve Industrial Committee Until Regional Plans Are Set

The establishment of an economic and industrial development department for the county has been shelved until a definite plan for regional government in Halton is announced.

Agreeing to shelve the plans for the department last week County Council requested the industrial development committee look into the possibility of setting up an information centre to direct industries wishing to locate in the county.

SPECIAL COMMITTEE
A special warden's committee was set up in June, composed of Milton's Reeve Ron Harris, Warden Allan Day, and county clerk Garfield Brown, to look into the possibilities of setting up such a department.

They met with Lloyd Hasall, chief of the industrial development branch of the provincial government and N. Ross Bradford, director of the Department of Trade and Development.

PAROCHIAL IDEAS
In its report to council, the committee states one of the advantages of an industrial and economic department.

"It would be much easier for the province to deal with one

designated person at the county level than have to visit several municipal officials appointed or elected, in other areas of the county."

"However" Mr. Bradford suggested, "it is very difficult to get away from the parochial attitudes and that possibly our study would include the integration of the two present full-time positions as they appear in the lower part of the county, namely Oakville and Burlington."

NOT RIGHT
But Warden Day said this week that if business and industrial and development departments of Oakville and Burlington were not amalgamated into the county department, it would not be right to compete with them.

"Or if we asked them to join us and later Burlington was not to be included in a Halton government region, then the town would lose its business development department and would have to start all over again," he added.

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Replies Opposed to Marijuana: Whiting

Halton riding MP Rud Whiting said this week he has received a variety of public reaction to the Le Dain Commission report on the non-medical use of drugs in Canada.

Three weeks ago Whiting made a public appeal in the press for residents of Halton to submit to him their feelings about the non medical use of drugs.

"I have started to receive a variety of opinion in the form of letters and they are most welcome," said Whiting.

ALL OPPOSED

He said all those replying to his invitation to submit reaction are opposed to the legalizing of marijuana. The LeDain report suggested more liberal laws governing the use of marijuana.

Whiting said letters of reaction on the drug problem can be sent to him c/o his office in the House of Commons, Ottawa.

James Black told them if they did not tell the truth they could be punished.

ELEMENT OF RISK

The boy's mother told the court she had not seen the assault but noticed her son was upset after the alleged assault.

Belleghem argued legal precedent had been set stating evidence given by unsworn witnesses contained an element of risk.

Judge Black dismissed the charge against the man. He said "there is evidence of three unsworn witnesses of the assault, but the mother was not able to testify there was an assault."

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
