"This is a direct contravention of your by-law which states only Friday, Saturday, Sunday or holiday racing during September and October."

The original intent of the by-law was to avoid racing during school nights, so the Sunday was allowed to make up for the lost Wednesday.

NO ARGUMENT

"I thought it read after Labour Day," said the deputy reeve. At this point Bowman pulled out the by-law and read it. His statement was confirmed.

"There's no argument about it," said the reeve, "he should not have raced on Wednesday night. What are we going to do about it?" he asked.

When no councillor answered Bowman read aloud from the by-law, saying "there shall be a penalty of \$300 plus costs for each offence." He then said "You could always revoke his license."

Pinnally council decided to

consult the lawyer again, this time to ask his advice regarding prosecuting the Golden Horse-shoe Dragway.

When council felt they needed a witness, a letter from David Craig was read aloud, in which he stated the track was in operation Wednesday, Sept. 2nd. Bowman said he had phoned Craig and Craig was willing to be a witness.

TRESPASSING

Bowman also told council he had laid 11 charges of trespassing, and had paid Pinkerton's \$122 to guard his place when he was away.

Deputy reeve Tom Hill suggested the area on the 6th Line from No. 7 Highway to 32 Side-road could be a No Parking area. "The OPP have to enforce our traffic by-laws," he remarked.

"This could eliminate my trespassing problems," commented Bowman.

Council agreed to draw up a by-law prohibiting parking on that section of the 6th Line.

Township Will Share Cost of Railway Safety

Esquering will pay 12 1/2% of the cost of installing further safety measures at three railroad crossings in the township, it was decided Monday night.

Two flashing lights, a bell and a signal crossarm will be installed at the 1st Line crossing at a total cost of \$14,000. Two flashing lights and a bell will be installed at the 4th Line crossing, at a total cost of \$14,800.

Two flashing light signals, short arm gates, and a bell will be installed at the 5th Line crossing at a total cost of \$32,600.

Esquering will pay 12 1/2% of the cost, but will pay 50% per year of the maintenance costs.
