## Move to Legalize Paid Sunday Sport in Esquesing

Paid Sunday sport will be legal in Esquesing township following the passing of a by-law which council authorized Monday night. Until now Esquesing as not passed a by-law amending the Lord's Day Act, a mandatory measure before Sunday sport is legal.

The by-law was precipitated by Peter Bowman, a foe of the olden Horseshoe Dragway, which was allowed by the township to operate on Sundays during September and October. Mr. Bowman issued a complaint under the Lord's Day Act.

#### CHANGE HOURS

Council also passed a motion to draw up a by-law changing the hours of operation of the dragway, and any other racing meets. The Sunday hours were changed from starting time of 1 p.m. to 1:30 p.m., the time set out in the Lord's Day Act, and a finishing time of 7:30 rather than the previous 7 p.m. Sunday racing is allowed only during September and October. Statutory holidays must abide by the same hours as Sunday racing.

The starting time other days Monday to Saturday through June, July and August and Friday and Saturday, during September and October, will be 3 p.m. an hour later than before, and a finishing time of 11:30 a.m. the same as before.

#### ROUGH

A clause which owner Carl Bristow termed 'rough' says no engines may start for tuning or practice before 12:30 p.m. on any Sunday.

This clause followed statements by Peter Bowman that the engine noise started at 10:30 a.m. last Sunday.

The owner of the Dragway readily admitted he had operated Wednesday, September 2, saying he thought the no week night clause during September and October only went into force after the children were back at school. "This was the intent, wasn't it?" he asked.

The reeve said it was, but the by-law actually stipulated Friday, Saturday and Sunday only from the beginning of the month.

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## Was Town's Mayor, Reeve Now Building, Zoning Head

John also organizes the Ontario championships, which take place in Orangeville.
