Teacher's Personality in Religion 'All Important'

The teacher of religion must be an instrument for bringing the spirit, the inner teacher into the lives of his students.

This is what Father Harvey Roach, Director of Religious Education for the Roman Catholic diocese of Hamilton told teachers of the Halton County Roman Catholic Separate School Board.

He said children are more motivated by what they see in a teacher than what they hear from him. In order to bring God into a child's life, therefore the teacher must know God personally and in depth.

This is the way the religion program is now taught in the

separate schools, he said. He began his talk by outlining different ways religious education had been taught in the past.

Father Roach was keynote speaker at the meeting, which also served to welcome and bring together teachers in the system. The new assistant superintendent, Mrs. K. Kenifick, two family life counsellors, Mrs. Mary Fitzsimmons and Sister M. Paulette and the new guidance co-ordinator, Peter Guerriero, were introduced.
