

# Mary-Ellen Stockley, Robert Jepson Wed in Double Ring Ceremony

The wedding was solemnized between Mary-Ellen Louise Stockley and Mr. Robert Neville Jepson, in St. George's Anglican Church, Georgetown, on Saturday, August 8, 1970 at 4 p.m. in a double ring ceremony officiated by Reverend Eric C. Mills. The bride chose an English style wedding in which she and her godfather entered the church after the flower girls and ring bearer, with senior attendants following her.

The bride is the daughter of Mrs. Eleanor Stockley, of 141 Main Street North, Georgetown. She has been employed for four years part-time at Superior Food Market in Georgetown. She attended Chapel Street Public School and Georgetown High School here in town. Last year she completed the first year of a two year course in computer programming at Sheridan College in Brampton. She has decided to work for awhile now and then complete her training at a later date.

The groom is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Alec (Bob) Jepson, of 2 Arletta Street, Georgetown. He was employed at Superior Food Market as produce clerk for about 8 years part time. He also attended Chapel Street Public School and Georgetown High School. The end of the last school term he graduated from a 2 year course at Sheridan College at Brampton, with honours in Mechanical Drafting. On returning from the honeymoon he started to work at Shell Canada in Oakville as a Research Technician.

The church altar was decorated with miniature white carnations and pink bridal roses scattered throughout the arrangements. Mr. George De Kleer was the organist.

The bride was given in marriage by her godfather, Chester Stevens of Pauline Street, Georgetown. Her gown was traditional white with a mid-Victorian effect, floor length nylon tulle over taffeta, with nylon

puft sleeves both with appliqued white daisies and daisy leaves around the bottom of the shoulder length neck piece and at the empire waistline, the headpiece was made up of a stiff netting with nylon sheer over it and daisies in the centre and daisy leaves on the outside edges. The train was 9 feet long and appliqued with daisy leaves along the edges. For something old, the bride wore a family heirloom which was a cameo necklace of her grandmother's which had been brought to her by her husband from Italy in 1912; and for something borrowed she carried a white lace handkerchief from her sister-in-law to be, Pat Jepson that she herself had carried at her wedding which had been given to her from her grandmother. The bride's bouquet was a cascading arrangement of miniature white carnations with bridal pink roses and lily-of-the-valley arranged in silver netting which concealed the handle of the bouquet.

The attendants' gowns were in pastel shades of nylon sheer over taffeta. Maid of honour and cousin of the bride, Janice Comley, Stratford, wore mauve; bridesmaid and good friend, Marie Fendley, Norval, wore maize; and bridesmaid and sister-in-law of the groom, Mrs. Patricia Jepson wore mint. The girls' gowns all had daisies applied in a semi-circle style around the bustline and wore long elbow length gloves. They carried large bouquets of baby mums tinted to match the colour of their gowns, shoes and ribbon roses in their hair.

The smaller attendants' gowns were also in coinciding pastel colours, of the same material, Peter Pan collars and daisies applied around the waistline. Flower girls were Susan Shafl, Acton, and Judy Hall, Georgetown, who wore mint coloured gowns and carried smaller bouquets of mint tinted baby mums. Train carriers were Susan and Shelley Jepson, nieces of the groom who wore maize coloured gowns. The lit-

tle girls all wore large bows with streamers flowing down the side of their hair and wrist length gloves. All the attendants' gowns were floor length and bouquets were cascading.

The groom's attendants wore Duarte DaPonte, Georgetown, groomsmen: Carroll Darsan, Trinidad, usher and Kent Korzack, cousin of the groom, Georgetown, usher. They all wore black double-breasted tuxedos with the traditional black bow ties and white pleated shirts with the white boutonniere. The groom's tuxedo outfit was the same as his attendants with the exception that he wore a black criss-cross bow tie instead of the straight style. John Shafl, Acton, acted as ring bearer wearing a white satin shirt, golden sash and brown corduroy flared pants and a mauve tinted boutonniere to match the maid of honour's colours.

The bride's gifts to her attendants were black diamond necklaces and for her junior attendants golden heart lockets which were all worn the day of the wedding.

The groom gave his attendants tie-tack and cuff-link sets and to his junior attendant John, a small tie-tack.

The bride's gift to the groom was a tiger-eye tie-tack and cuff link set; and the groom's gift to the bride was a gold heart locket.

It was an evening reception held at the Riviera Club, Norval and attended by 110 people.

The bride's mother received wearing a mint green chiffon dress with split overlay jacket effect with jeweled neckline, and matching accessories. She was assisted by the groom's mother who chose a metallic brocade dress in shades of pink with silver accessories. Both mothers wore miniature pink carnation corsages.

The Riviera was decorated with white wedding bells and pink, yellow and white streamers above the head-table and white carnations in bud vases at every table.

The bride and groom were joined at the table by the bride's maid of honour, mother, aunt, Mrs. Ella McBurney, Stratford, cousins, Mr. and Mrs. Stan Cobourn, Brighton, and bridesmaid Marie Fendley and on the groom's side, his groomsmen, his father and mother, his brother and sister-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Kerry Jepson, Georgetown, and his sister Cherry.

The bride chose a Spanish effect for a going away outfit. She wore a white wet-look sombrero, white crepe blouse with scallops down the front and on the sleeves, black tuxedo flared pants, and an orange hand crocheted vest along with snakeskin accessories. She chose an orange-tinted carnation corsage to finish off the outfit.

After throwing the traditional blue garter and bouquet which was made up of the same flowers as that of her bouquet, the couple left for their honeymoon. They spent a couple of days in Niagara returned home and then left again for the Muskoka Vacationlands. They returned on August 28th, in time to attend her girl friend's Roscenne Parry's wedding the next day.

The couple are living in the front apartment of the bride's mother's home, at 141 Main St. North, Georgetown.

Out-of-town guests included people from Stratford, Camp Borden, Brighton, Burlington, Rockwood, Acton, Toronto,

Brampton, Mississauga and Norval. Mr. Percy Conley, father of the maid of honour and cousin of the bride's mother acted as master of ceremonies. The bride and groom were toasted by the master of ceremonies, the groomsmen, the groom's father, and Mr. Morris Miller, of Toronto.

Two of the bridal party Susan Shafl (flower girl) and her 3 year old brother John (ring bearer) were back less than 24 hours from a 3 week trip to England with their mother, Mrs. June Shafl.

Prior to her marriage the bride was given miscellaneous showers by Mrs. Shirley Robinson, Guelph St., Georgetown, a good friend of the bride with whom she had worked at Superior; Mrs. Linda Mountain (Linda Harley), Georgetown, a bride herself of only a few weeks; Brampton; and Mrs.
