#### Commendations Would Spread

After Hennelly mentioned that the board now knows where the attendance problems are, trustee John R. Visser asked, "Are they (the absent teachers) still with us?" "Well, I don't know" smiled Hennelly, "some might have left."

Board members indicated that the commendations of the '14 "would spread around" and convince teachers that the board was watching.
