FINE TROUT FISHING AT HOCKLEY VALLEY CLUB

Recently my wife, Beaver and I had the privilege of fly fishing for speckled trout and rainbow trout at Curt Church's trout club, two miles north of Hockley Village.

To start with Curt made us welcome and introduced us to his wife Mrs. Church who is a musician as well as an artist. He then showed us around a little and told us to feel at home and room around and look things over.

The trout pond is surrounded with cedar trees. A nice spring creek flows into the upper part of the pond. Surrounding the water are approximately 16 docks to cast from.

LEFT UNTIL SPRING

Tents are erected complete with wood flooring on each side of the pond so his guests can take shelter in bad weather.

Curt also showed us fish cages that will hold several hundred trout. These are submerged in the water and left until spring. The trout are fed pellets during the winter.

When released in the spring the trout are big enough and strong enough to fend for themselves.

We spent the balance of the day fly fishing with barbless hooks. Curt prefers that the trout be released by shaking them off the hook while they are still in the water. If the trout are kept there is a charge for each one according to size.

Despite the fact they are pond trout they apparently are hard to catch. The wood duck fly and maribou were the best producers the day we were there despite the bad weather.

OPENINGS FOR MEMBERS

Curt has openings for members on a yearly basis.

The pond is open to fishing all year round providing there is open water. So just imagine latching on to a nice thick-bodied rainbow in November or December.

In the meantime, if your young one's or you would like to try your luck some nice day this fall take a short drive to Curt Church's, his hospitality is genuine.

FINIAN'S RAINBOW

Six year old Jillian Drennan and just as Irish as her name, can vouch for that. She and her parents have been in Canada since April of this year. She caught two nice rainbows and one speckled trout while at the pond with her parents recently.

She seemed very proud of the trout and very glad she came to Canada. They live in Aurora at 42 Richardson Drive.

PUFF BALL

Grover Norton and his two grandson's Blake and Wayne Harrison ages 4 and 5 years were kind enough to give me a nice large firm puff-ball recently. While they were here I tied them each a trout fly on barbless hooks.

The tail of the fly was red hackle fibres, ribbing was tinsel from France, body was pea-

cock herl, wing mandarin duck flank and the hackle was brown rooster neck hackle.

They also took home some golden pheasant tippets and some gold crest feathers from the golden pheasant.

They also had the rare experience of sitting on a large 8'x4 foot timber wolf pelt while drinking their ginger ale and watching an outdoor program on TV.

CONSIDERED A DELICACY

Puff balls are considered a delicacy by many people including myself I fry them in butter and have toast and coffee with them I also consider them very good as a side dish with my steak.

How do they come to grow in the first place? Grover Norton says it's worth \$10,000 to anyone who can find a way to grow them in quantity. To quote Grover under wild apple trees is always a good spot to look. Along hedge rows and around old rotten wood piles are other likely spots.

About puff balls the dictionary says, any of certain fungi characterized by a ball-like fruit body which emits a cloud of spores when broken.

Yes it sure is disgusting when we find one later on when it has turned brown. Naturally we give it a kick and puff, out comes the brown dust. It makes us feel sorry that such a delicacy went to waste.

The fourth quarter was scoreless.

There were four fumbles, three interceptions and 160 yards in penalties in the game.
