**Abortion Discussed in Talk to Med-Secs**

Dr. J. Hoey, Obstetrician and Gynecologist, was guest speaker at the October meeting of the Brampton and District Medical Secretaries' Association. Fourteen medical secretaries attended the meeting held at 178 John St., Brampton. Dr. Hoey presented his views on sterilization, therapeutic abortion and Abortion on Demand. He discussed the numerous points which have to be considered in relation to the physical health and emotional well being of the patient in question. He encouraged the group to state their queries and points of view.

Dr. Hoey also answered many questions with regards to infertility and other obstetrical gynaecological topics. The November meeting will be held in Georgetown, with Dr. B. C. Hoddinott of Georgetown as guest speaker.

**4th Line, 17 Sideroad Can't Be Truck Routes**

After two hours of debate, Esqueuing council and 20 ratepayers found themselves back where they were last week and the week before.

Over the vehement opposition of Cr. Ken Marshall, a motion was passed deleting the 4th Line from Lots 18 to 24, and the 17 sideroad from Concession 5 to 7 from the list of designated truck routes. Almost the identical motion was passed unanimously October 12, except the previous motion stated it was subject to Dept. of Highways, and Transport approval. Last week, October 19, a motion directing Indusmin to use 22 sideroad out to 25 highway was passed.

**HAVEN'T GOT GUTS**  
 The decisive point in the debate came when deputy reeve Tom Hill stated he had travelled all the truck routes with representatives of the quarry, and came to the conclusion that any route other than the one sought by ratepayers of both areas, Limehouse and 17 sideroad would result in delegations every week.

H listed the number of residents on each route, and cited the large number of children attending Limehouse School as safety hazards. "It's the safety factor I'm interested in," he stated, "I'd hate to be sitting here when somebody was killed because we haven't got the guts to tell them what to do," he added.

This remark was greeted with a round of applause.

**WHO CHANGES MIND**  
 When a recorded vote was asked for Cr. Ken Marshall agreed with the request saying "I think the ratepayers should know who changes their mind under pressure."

The motion passed with all but Marshall in favour, this resulted in another round of applause.

The discussion began amicably with John Michie, spokesman for the 17 sideroad and 4th line residents, thanking council for their action the previous week. He asked if the permits to truckers already issued would now be changed to make the use of these two roads illegal.

Clerk Delmar French pointed out that local road users, having permits could travel any road in the township.

Michie agreed with this saying this was their right but added "We are simply trying to have last week's motion implemented."

**CAN'T ENFORCE**  
 Mrs. A. J. Markham said the OPP told her they could not enforce the route change unless they were notified by the municipal office. The deputy reeve explained that the road superintendent who issues the permits had been away on vacation but had returned.

Ralph McKeown, principal of Limehouse school, told of the danger to school children, since there was no place for them to walk. "One side is too wet, and the other side has a high bank," he commented. He asked if empty trucks were allowed to go back through Limehouse.

Later in the meeting, the

road superintendent explained that an empty truck, provided it doesn't weigh over 11 tons can use any road. In Limehouse the 10 ton limit on the bridge would also be a controlling factor.

**ISSUED FOR YEAR**  
 The reeve and deputy reeve promised to try to prod the Halton County Road Committee into action, since 22 is a county road.

In answer to a question from John Michie, road superintendent Bud Snow, said the permit issued for the 4th Line and 17 sideroad were valid until the police and permit holders were notified to the contrary.

**TOO JUMBLED**  
 Another lengthy hassle developed when the deputy reeve and Cr. Miller put a motion which Cr. Marshall claimed was too jumbled, and should be at least two motions.

"I'll divide it into five, if it will get some action," retorted deputy reeve Tom Hill.

"It's time we used common sense" said Cr. Marshall, "we're bringing this township into a state of ridicule, and most of the ratepayers are aware of it."

Finally, the motion deleting the 4th Line and 17 sideroad from the list of truck routes was passed, with only Cr. Marshall opposing.

"If trucks travel that route, don't call me, call the OPP" the road superintendent told the audience. He will now have to rewrite the truck permits, and copies will be sent to the OPP and the truckers.

Cr. Ken Marshall went into a description of the OPP whom, he claimed, backed council's action in making the 17 sideroad a truck route. "The OPP say it's a forward step."

Again Cr. Miller asked if the motions were legal.

The clerk said they were legal and valid, and the only reason they hadn't been acted upon was because of the road superintendent's absence.

Michie quietly pointed out that had been his original question.

"The permits are issued for a year," replied the road superintendent "and I can't change them on your say so."

Michie then asked council to follow up last week's motion by authorizing Bud Snow to change the permits.

**SERVING NO PURPOSE**  
 "This discussion is serving no useful purpose," broke in Cr. Ken Marshall "let's get on with our business."

Reeve George Currie also indicated he felt the discussion should be drawn to a conclusion.
