# Bag or Burn? Leaves Dilemma

You can spend hours stuffing dead leaves into those green, plastic garbage bags.

Or you can dispose of the fallen leaves the quick and highly illegal way — by burning them.

Your choice depends on your gambling spirit and how you feel about air pollution.

Burning leaves has always been a pleasant fall tradition which many Georgetown residents either still don't realize is now contravention of a recently introduced provincial statute, or choose to continue and take their chances.

But leaf burning has become a serious air pollution matter.

According to the Air Management Branch of the Ontario Department of Energy and Resources, smoke from burning leaves creates a two fold problem.

1. It is an irritant, aggravating to respiratory ailments, such as asthma and emphysema.
2. It contributes to overall community air pollution by increasing contaminants already present from other sources such as automobiles and industry.

It has been estimated that smoke from a bushel of leaves is as unhealthy as the smoke from 4,000 cigarettes burned to the last shred of tobacco.

One pound of leaves, burned in the open, produces 600 times as many pollutants as one pound of coal burned in a furnace.

# Township of Esquesing AUDITOR'S REPORT FOR 1969

To the Council and Ratepayers of the Township of Esquesing:

Dear Sirs:

We have made an examination of the books and accounts of the Township of Esquesing and its associated Boards for the year ended December 31, 1969. The examination has been conducted in accordance with the regulations of the Department of Municipal Affairs and there is attached a completed questionnaire covering specific auditing requirements.

The Township ended the year with a small deficit of \$301.00. Comparisons of the various items of revenue and expenditure with the budget are shown on statements 1-1 and 1-3.

Arrears of taxes continue to increase amounting to \$262,153.00 at the year end or 29.08% of the current year's levy. In an effort to increase collections the penalty rates have been increased for 1970 but in addition to this a constant follow-up on arrears is required.

We also recommend a modernization of accounting procedures with the installation of some machine book-keeping.

Allowances for accumulated sick leave to employees are starting to build up and we suggest a fund should be built up annually for this. There is no consistent policy for dealing with employees accumulated sick leave — at least three different bases are now in use. We believe a consistent policy should be established here.

**AUDITOR'S OPINION**

We hereby report that in our opinion:

1. The financial transactions which have come under notice have been within the powers of the municipality.
2. The audit has been conducted in accordance with the instructions of the Department of Municipal Affairs.
3. The financial statements present fairly the financial position of the municipality as at December 31, 1969, and the results of its operations for the year ended on that date.
