ESQUEESING COUNCIL BRIEFS

● Esqueeing Council on Monday accepted the tender of J. C. Duff to supply 2,500 tons of winter sand at \$1.55 a ton, delivered to the municipal yard at Stewartstown.

● Accepted the tender of Bailey Construction for snowploughing at \$11.50 an hour and \$11.50 a day stand-by pay, from December 15 till March 15.

● Called for tenders for a 4 wheel drive, 90 horse power front end loader with back-hoe attachments, complete with bucket and scoop.

● Passed a by-law authorizing the borrowing of \$15,750 to assist in the purchase of a fire truck for Esqueeing fire area No. 1. The money will be borrowed from the capital reserve fund and paid by a special levy on Esqueeing Fire area No. 1 over a two year period.

● Accepted the tender of G. F. Browne to supply a truck for sanding at \$5 per hour and \$5 per day stand-by time, from December 15 till March 15.

● Accepted the tender of Wheeler's Haulage to supply 1 truck for sanding at \$5.25 per hour and \$3.25 stand-by time from December 15 till March 15.

● Building inspector Tom McLean reported to council that a total of \$122,704 in building permits was issued during Oct. All were residential permits.

Auto Accidents Ring Up \$3500 in Property Damage

Jim Woudenberg, 18, of 11 Credit Street, Glen Williams, suffered a sore neck in a two vehicle accident Friday afternoon in front of 67 Guelph St. It was the only accident of five investigated on the weekend by Georgetown police involving injury.

Woudenberg went to hospital on his own for examination. Woudenberg was driving a 1969 Ford van, and Peter Buzat of 52 Main St., was driving a 1970 Oldsmobile. Damage was put at \$1,000 and \$400 respectively.

In another two car collision on the same night, \$400 total damage resulted when a car operated by Helen Davies of 69 Sargent Road hit a parked, unoccupied car belonging to Donald J. Herrington 12 Sarah St. on the Georgetown Market parking lot.

Police placed damage at \$300 to the Herrington 1969 Pontiac and \$150 to the other car a 1969 Ford.

There were three automobile accidents on Halloween. In the first just after midnight Friday a car driven by George Walker of 10 Delrex Blvd. failed to negotiate a turn at the Mountainview Road, River Drive corner and ended up in a ditch with \$500 damage.

The pavement was wet and it was raining at the time.

Two trucks and a car tangled in a three car accident at noon hour. The 1967 Ford dump truck driven by Cyril Crocker of Hillsburgh, 1953 Mercury pick-up driven by Brian Srou of 74 Guelph Street, and 1968 Ford car driven by Frank Robinson of 15 Ostrander Blvd. collided opposite 76 Guelph Street.

The investigating officer here placed damage at \$900 to the dump truck, \$150 to the pick-up and \$125 to the car.

Halloween night Randall Nicholls of 42 Main St. in a 1961 Comet, and John Clarke of 34 Ewing St. in a 1966 Pontiac escaped injury when their vehicles hit at the corner of Water and Mill Street while travelling in opposite directions.

Judo is both an art and a sport, a means of defense, and equally a means of offense. The ultimate objective is the perfection of one's self by the systematic training of the mind and body through exercise so that each works in harmony with the other. It is not a matter of learning a few tricks which can then be applied for self-defense or physical culture.

It has been said that all games originated from some form of training for combat. Judo maintains the martial aspect of those early games since its objectives are:

1. Development of the body
2. Skill in contest
3. Making the opponent surrender



Proficiency in a contest is one of the ultimate tests of a judo man's ability. In a judo contest only one point is needed to defeat the opponent. Because there is no second chance, both contestants are under great strain. The contest lasts only a few seconds. Points may be awarded on the following basis:

1. A clean throw that lands the opponent on his back;
2. Holding the opponent for 30 seconds;
3. Making the opponent surrender because of a hold.
