- The Council of the Corporation of the TOWNSHIP OF ESQUESING intends to apply to The Ontario Municipal Board for approvol of erection of a New Fire Hall at an estimated cost of \$20,000 and intends to charge the whole of the cost of the work at a special rate for a period of 10 years upon buildings only in the Esquesing Fire Area No. 1,
- It is proposed to borrow the required funds from the Esquesing Capital Reserve Fund, and to repay the Fund in 10 equal annual installments and to pay the Capital Reserve Fund interest at the rate of 5 per cent per annum on the outstanding balance.
