Though we are living fast and forget quickly, no serious-minded Canadian is already over the jolt we received by the violent and tragic events that have taken place in Quebec a few weeks ago. That such a thing could take place in our own Canada few people may have believed to be possible. And yet they did happen.

If not the first, then certainly the second reaction with many concerned countrymen is a sense of shame. We, respected Canada, often pointed to as an example, called to keep the peace among other nations; we have not been able to keep peace and harmony in our own country. Even a proclamation of the War Measures Act seemed to be necessary, to protect and preserve our cherished democratic freedoms.

Now what can we do? We can react as the frustrated decent parents, who are called into the police station, and, finding their teen-ager in deep trouble, immediately start bawling him out and complain that they would have never expected this, and can't understand how . . . and yes, sir, he is for sure going to hear and feel about this.

Of course I don't question the right or even the duty of our government to hold criminals responsible for their deeds and punish them according to law. But that does not do anything about the cause and solution of this tragedy, which is only an extreme exponent of THE PROBLEM.

THE REAL PROBLEM - as I think the Holy Scriptures picture it and how come we haven't learned more in those 2000 years? - is: we believe that we can save ourselves, our country, and world by ourselves (if only we can get rid of those who diametrically oppose us!)

But what party or policy, technique or organization, or change in any of them will do us any good, as long as we do not change from the heart out towards our fellowmen, in particular towards those with whom we do NOT want to identify ourselves?

The Bible tells us that without the spirit of God, without Jesus Christ coming to LIFE in us, we can't do it.

We hate laws unless we know and love the Lawgiver. I don't recognize my Father unless I want to be His son. And if I don't accept Him, I have no Brothers either. Only comrades (up-in-arms and enemies).

Only when we find God as our Father in Jesus Christ as our first-born brother, we can go out and will go out of our cozy and insecure selfishness to see and find those who are lost to Him and us, to the Father's family of mankind. That is the basic message and task of the Christian Church rightly so named. Are you in the Family business? That is the real FRONT DU LIBERATION DE QUEBEC. But not Quebec only.
