

## Extra Social Worker to Help Overburdened Staff

County council last week approved hiring an extra full-time case worker to help relieve the over-worked social and family services department.

Chairman of the social and family services committee, Reeve Ron Harris of Milton, told council his committee had gone into an emergency sitting just before council to make the recommendation.

"At the end of October 718 cases were being handled by six field workers and some were working with as many as 150 people. The normal case load they should be handling is 50 each," he said.

**CASE LOAD**  
Figures on the October case loads were presented to council.

- Two case workers in Oakville handle 83 and 122 cases ea., for a total increase of 12 since July.

- Two case workers in Burlington handle 123 and 100 cases each, for a total increase of 22 since July.

- One case worker in Northern Halton (from No. 15 Sideroad to the northern boundary and from the east-west boundary) handles 143 cases.

This area includes Georgetown and Acton and there has been a total increase in cases of 79 since July.

- One case worker in Southern Halton (from No. 18 Sideroad to Hwy. 5 and from the east-west boundary) handles 100 cases, including 20 from Halton Manor. This total load has jumped by 28 since July.

"We tried boundary juggling but this didn't work," Harris said.

Hiring the extra worker will represent an increase of \$2070 in the budget with the province paying half the social worker's wages.

## Bruce Trail Hike For 5th Cub Pack
