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No Living Cost Bonus For CA Social Workers

The board of directors of Halton Children's Aid Society flatly turned down a five per cent "cost of living" bonus for its social workers.

Craig Frazer, chairman of the board's personnel committee, made the recommendation at last Thursday night's monthly meeting.

He said that although the CAS' current salary schedule is in line with other societies, the committee felt a five per cent hike was in order so the society would not get into a "competitive situation."

WOULD JUST ADD

Reeve Ron Harris pointed out the CAS already had a regular increment policy and this move "would just add to the current inflation by instituting a cost of living bonus."

Earlier in the meeting the board was unanimous in voting a six per cent wage increase to the CAS clerical staff, retroactive to Jan. 1, 1970.

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Seek Local Donors for Pakistan Relief Fund

Georgetown and district people wishing to send relief to the surviving victims of the recent devastating cyclone and tidal wave that killed hundreds of thousands in the coastal districts and offshore islands of East Pakistan may send their contributions to:

Canadian Red Cross Society, 95 Wellesley Street East, Toronto 5, Ontario.

The donations should be clearly marked Pakistan Relief. Over \$91,000 worth of aid has been sent by and through the Canadian Red Cross Society to assist the survivors.

In addition to the initial cash grant of \$10,000 sent by the Canadian Red Cross on Nov. 15

in response to the worldwide appeal issued by the League of Red Cross Societies, \$2,500 has been given by Red Cross Youth and 64 cartons of new clothing made by volunteer women through the Women's Work Program of the Canadian Red Cross Society (valued at \$26,000) has been rushed from the league's warehouse in Singapore to Dacca.

The Federal Government made a contribution of \$50,000 and individual donations of some \$3,000 have already been received from concerned citizens throughout Canada. The money will be used to purchase desperately needed food and emergency supplies.

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
