# Raps NDP, Auld Says Against Private Enterprise

Halton Tories got a taste Monday night of campaign slogans being warmed up by their party for use in the provincial election expected next year.

The election talk was served up by minister of tourism and information James Auld at the annual meeting of the Halton (federal) and Halton East (provincial) Progressive Conservative Association.

## NDP PARTY

Auld had this to say about the New Democratic Party.

"The NDP rhetoric can only lead to a capital outflow at the very time we need a capital inflow. Socialism means less jobs, and smaller incomes, particularly

if investors feel the NDP have even a remote chance of forming a government in this province at some future date."

"Canadian independence will not be maintained simply by flirting with socialism and shouting anti-American slogans, but through the defence of our own traditions and institutions, and the desire of our people to develop common sense policies that will not build a cultural and economic wall around the province."

"The NDP relishes a campaign waged on class warfare and jingoism, and I believe in the next election they will pursue more vigorously a policy of polarization — the left against

the moderates, socialism against the private enterprise economy."

## SURVIVING

He called life in Ontario surviving in an era of accelerated change. Auld said only the Tories could supply the stability needed to find the way through transition and change.

He indicated that the struggle for national unity would be a provincial election issue, saying the Liberals will mount a campaign of sectionalism in the next general election and the NDP one of polarization.

About 55 Progressive Conservatives attended the meeting at the Royal Canadian Legion Hall in Oakville.
