# Claim Gravel Mining Threat To Scenic, Recreation Area

In a letter to Allen Lawrence Ontario Minister of Mines, the Terra Cotta and District Preservation committee has expressed concern about extensive gravel mining operations underway on the Halton-Peel town line at 32 Glideroad, Esquesing.

The letter, signed by W. E. Doole, co-chairman of the committee, says that while Consolidated Sand and Gravel, the operators, has expressed sympathy with their concern, the committee regards this major pit development as a threat to the recreational and scenic character of the area.

### URGE STUDY

The letter continues:

We feel the project is incompatible with the Niagara Escarpment preservation measures recommended by Professor Gertler and by subsequent legislation. We are a relatively small group but represent the view point of hundreds of local residents and thousands of tourists and sightseers, as witnessed by signatures to several of our preservation petitions.

We are sure you are familiar with this historic & scenic part of Ontario and are aware that

Chinguacousy township and the Ontario government have in various official plans designated the area as recreational and greenbelt. We urge you to give careful study to the problems created by this new pit, and before renewing its license, to consider the following detrimental aspects which it creates.

### CREATE HAZARD

1. A heavy traffic problem involving huge tractor trailers which will create a hazard for the hundreds of patrons using the Terra Cotta Conservation Area, school buses, and general traffic on scenic and rural roads not designed for such. The number of day users at Terra Cotta Conservation Area in 1970 was 79,000 and the camping population was 23,308.

2. An environmental situation incompatible with the character of this district in general, and the Natural Science Centre operated by the Peel County Board of Education on immediately adjacent property, in particular.

# "ABOLISH PROVINCES" - KERNIGHAN

A Milton man has suggested that provincial governments be abolished and most of their law-making duties transferred to the federal government.

Murray S. Kernighan, a former federal candidate for the Halton NDPs, makes the suggestion in a brief to the Senate-Commons Committee on the Constitution of Canada.

Elections would be cut in half there would be only one Parliament to pay; some government departments could be combined where they exist at federal and provincial levels; one sales tax could be eliminated and one succession duty could disappear.

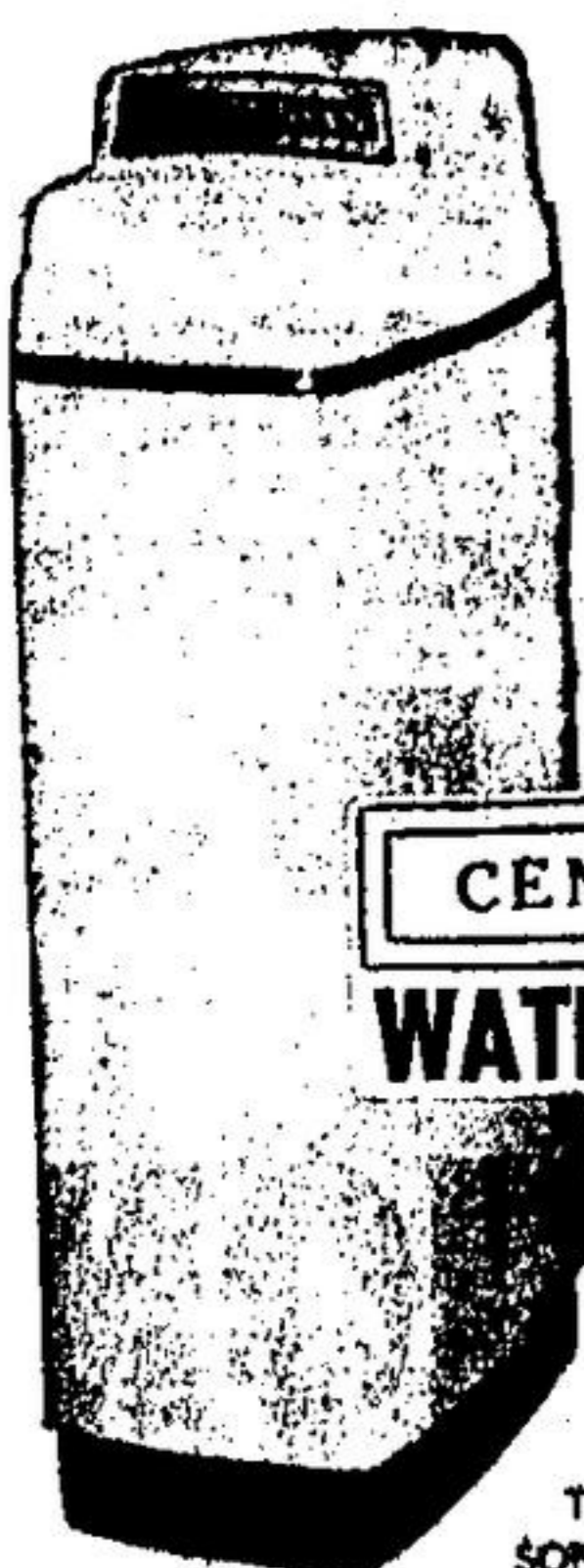

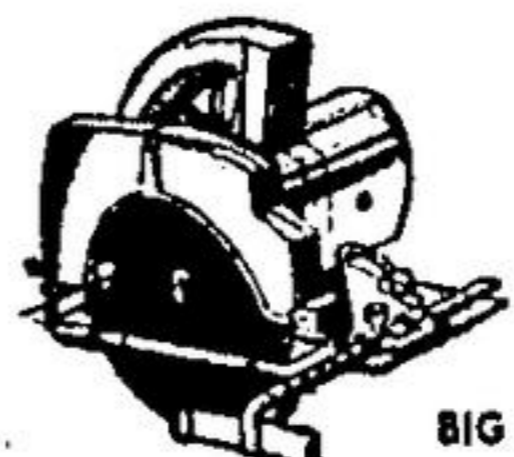

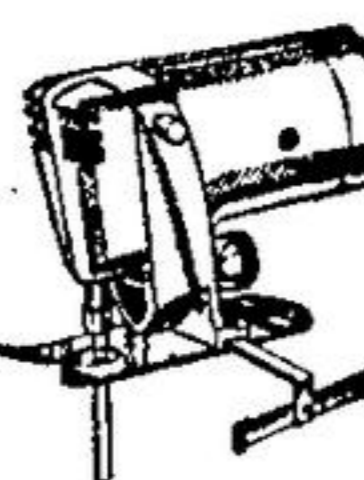
