

# Warden, Two Veteran County Employees are Honoured

Halton's 1970 Warden Reeve Allan Day of Oakville was honoured by fellow county councillors, staff members and special guests at the annual Warden's Dinner held in Oakville Friday.

But two county department heads who are retiring at the end of this year also shared the limelight. Miss Margaret Maxted, Halton's treasurer for the past 33 years was presented with a wrist watch and flowers and Andrew Frank, who has served as sheriff for 13 years was presented with a tie pin and cuff links bearing the county crest.

In proposing a toast to the warden, Acton Reeve Dr. F. G. Dakes, reviewed Warden Day's background of 15 years as a councillor in Oakville and five years as a member of Halton County Council as one of the town's senior representatives. "He had a very busy year as warden, said Reeve Dakes. "He is a man of good judgment and has done the job very well — the business of the county has been in good hands."

Reeve Mrs. A. MacArthur of Nassagaweya presented Warden Day with a wrist watch on behalf of the councillors and staff also the traditional gavel. She praised his sense of duty, patience, firmness, courtesy and tact. **LET'S PLAY BRIDGE**

We had a lot of fun last week at the Acton Bridge Club. Instead of our regular pairs game, we tried an individual movement. In the individual game, you play with every other person twice. The hands are still duplicated of course.

**Possible bidding:**

<b>SOUTH</b>	<b>WEST</b>	<b>NORTH</b>	<b>EAST</b>
Pass	Pass	1 S	Pass
2 C	Pass	3 H	Pass
3 NT	All Pass		

**Opening lead: 2 of diamonds**

I was defending on this hand so I was not involved directly in the bidding. I am surprised that no pair played this hand at spades. I think that South should give preference to spades at his second turn to bid. In this way the final contract would be four spades.

**Declarer Ducked**  
Declarer ducked the opening lead and won the diamond in his hand. Declarer should start work on the spade suit. This is the longest suit between the two hands and offers the best chance for additional tricks. One declarer however, decided to work on the club suit.

A club was led to the ace, and a lone club returned. East naturally played low. Declarer finessed the ten, losing to West's jack. West led a diamond to knock out dummy's ace. Declarer can still bring home the contract if he switches to spades.

The county's road committee meeting last week, heard engineer Robert Knight voice his concern.

"A deep crack has appeared on the bearing area on the east abutment," he said. I ask you to authorize council to pass a bylaw as soon as possible so we can post the bridge."

Councillor George Gardhouse told the roads committee a gravel pit was in operation in Esqueting Twp. and trucks of up to 50 ton are crossing the bridge now.

"There won't be a bridge there by spring if this traffic continues."

Cr. Gardhouse said there were two alternative routes for the trucks: "The pit is right in the middle of the Bruce Trail. I don't know how they got there," he said.

The committee unanimously agreed to present the bylaw to council authorizing the posting, and also gave instructions to Mr. Knight to start design plans on a new bridge.
