The buildings were insured but their contents including processing equipment storage boxes and produce, were uninsured.

One of the nicest things about the future is that it comes a day at a time.

Recommends Urea Better Than Salt

The use of urea rather than salt to melt ice on sidewalks, doorsteps, driveways, porches, etc., is recommended by a professor from the University of Guelph.

• Salt is highly corrosive and harms the grass beneath the snow so spring lawns are often discoloured and unhealthy.

• Professor Ross Irwin of the University of Guelph recommends that urea be used when temperatures are above 15 degrees Fahrenheit.

• Urea is as effective as salt in melting ice and no harmful effect on vegetation or pavement. It will fertilize grass rather than damage.

• Application of urea should be one pound to 100 square feet.

• More than the recommended rate will add to pollution problems because of the nitrogen in urea.

• Urea can be bought in 50 pound bags from any feed store.
