TERRA COTTA GROUP TAKES ACTION

Protest Gravel Pit as Bar to Preservation

A protest has been registered with Allan Lawrence, provincial minister of mines, by the Terra Cotta and District Preservation Committee regarding a gravel plt operation in Esquesing Twp, which the group terms " a threat to the scenic and recreational character of the area."

A letter signed by W. E. Doole, co-chairman of the group, was sent to the minister this week charging that the operation is incompatible with recommended Niagara Escarpment preservation measures supported by recent legislation.

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
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
